Dear friends

I wonder how well you know the Christmas story. It may surprise you to learn that there are not one, but two nativity stories in the bible. One appears near the beginning of Matthew's gospel and the other in Luke. The two tend to get conflated to produce the Christ-mas plays that we all remember from our school days. In Mark and John's gospels there are no stories of Jesus's birth - he simply ap-pears as a full-grown adult from the start.

Luke's story tends to be our preferred option. It contains the appearance of the angel Gabriel to Mary, the trek to Bethlehem, the kindly innkeeper who squeezes them in, and the angels appearing to the shepherds. Matthew's account is a darker affair, with the mysterious magi who come from unknown lands ('the east') and, their strange mission accomplished, return whence they came. It also has an angry Herod, deception, and the slaughter of the innocents.

As with so much of the bible, we need to concern ourselves not so much with the precise details as with the message the author is trying to convey. The writers of both nativity stories are trying to tell us, the readers, that here was a truly remarkable person - the long-awaited messiah who has come from God to show us the true nature of God's kingdom. John's Gospel goes even further in that magnificent prologue in the first few verses, proclaiming that "The Word was with God and the Word was God" and that he brings us life and light.

Our instinct in putting all these different stories together is a good one, because in doing so it becomes evident that here is something and someone who needs to be taken very seriously.

Angel Tree - Bringing the gift of joy to prisoners' families at Christmas

For someone in prison, Christmas is the most difficult of seasons. Families often struggle financially and their children have very little.

Angel Tree is a programme run by Prison Fellowship England and Wales. Volunteers buy, wrap and send gifts on prisoners' behalf with a personal message written by the prisoner to make the gift extra special. Gifts are accompanied by a Christian story-book appropriate to the child's age. By providing gifts to the children of prisoners, *Angel Tree* lessens the devastation experienced as a result of parental absence by not only helping families to connect and build relationships, but by providing children with much-needed joy.

When Prison Fellowship England and Wales launched its first *Angel Tree* programme in one prison in 1994, it delivered 60 presents. Last Christmas, the *Angel Tree* pro-gramme ran in 82 prisons, enabling 2,550 prisoners to send a gift to their children. Nearly 5,000 presents were sent out to children!

One parent wrote afterwards, "Thank you very much for helping me protect the deli-cate bond between my children and their dad. They need each other very much and it was magical for them to receive a Christmas present."

One parent in prison said, 'I had three children that received gifts. They were ex-tremely excited at receiving a gift and it made a fantastic surprise as they never thought their Dad could get them a gift this year. So, thank you with all my heart.' Prison Fellowship is always seeking individuals and churches to help with fundrais-ing, buying presents and wrapping gifts. - Keep an eye on the weather forecast and if you have a power cut or gas emergency, please check on neighbours too.

A CHRISTMAS RECIPE: PEAR, CHOCOLATE & MARZIPAN STRUDEL

(I have not tried this one yet, but I plan to over Christmas!)

Serves 6

85g Butter, melted, plus a little extra

5 Pears, peeled, cored and chopped

4 tbsp light muscovado sugar, plus extra for sprinkling

1 tbsp Disaronno (optional)

100g Ginger biscuits, crushed

1 tsp Ground cinnamon

100g Dark chocolate, broken into chunks

100g Marzipan, chopped into small pieces

250g pack filo (at least 6 sheets)

Icing sugar and cream to serve

Melt a knob of butter in a large frying pan, add the pears and 1 tbsp sugar, and cook for 5 mins. Tip into a bowl and leave to cool. Once cool, add the Disaronno (if using), biscuits cinnamon, chocolate, marzipan, and 2 tbsp sugar and mix well.

Line a tray with baking parchment. Lay a sheet of filo on it, brush with melted butter and sprinkle with a little sugar. Top with a second sheet of filo and keep going until you have used all the pastry. Pile the filling down one of the long sides of the pastry, then roll it up to form a sausage. Make sure it is seam side down, then tuck the ends under tightly. Roll up in the parchment, wrap tightly in foil and freeze.

Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Put a tray in the oven to heat. Un-wrap the strudel and place, seam-side down and still on the parchment, onto the tray. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle over 1 tbsp sugar.

Bake for 35-40mins, then dust with icing sugar. (can be made and frozen up to three months in advance.)

ASHFIELD FOOTPATH NETWORK.

Ashfield boasts one of the best maintained footpath networks any-where in Suffolk [according to SCC]. Ashfield Footpath Group was formed some years ago when the network was not in a particularly good state with the aim to rectify this, it was achieved and now we strive to keep this up. Once every year the entire path network is walked, signposts and bridges are inspected to ensure they are in good order and where necessary repairs or replacements are made. The annual audit has recently been completed and I am pleased to report that no route is totally impassable. In a few places work is required and will be undertaken to clarify/improve the surface of the routes concerned working in conjunction with the landowner if appropriate. A few signposts and waymarks have reached the end of their useful life and will be replaced.

We understand that the river crossings along Cretingham Lane that have been closed for sometime should be replaced during the cur-rent financial year which will reopen access to routes into Framsden, Cretingham and beyond!

We know many of you already use the paths and encourage more people to go out and explore what is on your doorstep. Should you encounter any problems whilst out do please let Malcolm
