Dear friends

It's been a long winter - cold and damp. Just when we thought it was over, back it came again. May is more than welcome, with a couple of bank holidays to boot.

I've recently read Jon McGregor's acclaimed novel, *Reservoir* 13, with its evocative portrayal of village life and vivid, detailed descriptions of the changing seasons, and the thread of a local tragedy weaved throughout. I recommend it.

As in real life, it is the relationships between people which are fascinating. Our own relationships may change with time as we get to know people better, but it is our relationships with one another which give us our identity and give quality to our lives. Perhaps this is why we hear so much these days about the blight of loneliness, where people may go for prolonged periods without seeing or speaking to anyone. They almost feel they have no existence because they are not recognised or acknowledged as being there. A few years ago a psychiatrist and theologian called Paul Fleischman wrote a book called The Healing Spirit - Case Studies in Religion and Psychotherapy. In it he described what he called "Witnessed Significance" which he regards as being needed by all of us, i.e. we need to be recognised, acknowledged and valued by our fellow human beings so that we feel 'significant'. It is not enough just to know we are here, we need others to see us as well, to bear 'witness' to our existence and to value us.

Obviously, it is best if we are kind to each other, but even disagreeing with someone may be better than ignoring them. At least they are recognising we exist and feel that we are worth considering! In the life of the ancient Hebrews, insofar as we can understand it from the pages of the Old Testament, there was a sense of 'everyone on board' - so that no-one was excluded from the corporate life of the people. It has sometimes been said that churches bring together people who might otherwise never meet because it is the only thing they have in common. That may be less the case in small villages where we are always bumping into the same people, but we know that maintaining those relationships will always be valuable so that no-one slips through the net; and it is heartening to see it.

#### Godparents - a real role to play

To be asked to become a godparent is a real honour. Ideally, it should go on to become a lifelong commitment that turns into a deep and loving relationship between godparent and child. Sadly, too often it wanes into a duty to be met by Christmas presents and birthday cheques.

A godparent is a member of the family 'once removed', and in an ideal position to enjoy the company of the young person without any parental responsibility. Godparents can share their life experiences, hobbies and past-times with the youngster, and thus greatly enrich their childhood.

These days many godparents are chosen with the idea of guardianship in mind, in case anything ever happen to the parents. But the practise of appointing godparents goes back many hundreds of years.

Godparents were originally known as sponsors, from the Latin word spondere, meaning 'to promise'. In pagan times a sponsor had to be known to the bishop when a person was introduced into the church. Godparents have the job of speaking up for the child. They must themselves have been baptised, though not necessarily confirmed.

Canon Law advises that 'for every child there are no fewer than three godparents'

Often parents choose two people from the same sex as the baby, and one other male/female. They can be friends or even members of the family.

#### My Suffolk House and other Verses by Joan Hudson. Published by <u>H B Maulden, Printer, Framlingham 1931</u>

I have recently come across a slim pamphlet and believe that it relates to Earl Soham. There is a poem featuring Richard Abbay, the rector who gave away apple trees and 'York-and- Lancaster' roses, having been buried in an oak coffin with no name plate on the lid. Another poem entitled " Ypres, 1915-Earl Soham 1930" and another "For Marjorie" - the old lady who lived on the Hill, mentioning archery meetings and bowling greens. She apparently died six years after the war (presumably WWI). With 'the far off rustle of crinolines' she may have been a teenager around 1860. Another poem called Harvest Festival, mentions Parson Browne and Cecil Potts.

However, I am most interested in trying to identify the Suffolk House. We are told it is timber built of galleon oak. The garden where it stands grows tamarisk, a fruitful mulberry and medlar. Among more modern trees on the lawn there is a wild pear. Roses grow between clipt hedges of snowberry with a fallow field beyond 'our measured grass'. Two dogs stand in the shade of a wide porch. The front door, with bottle pane, was red with blue/ green rush in the entrance hall. The whole place scented with lupin and eglantine. It has an 'old hall', the villagers 'come[ing] daily to the door] with their problems, down a drive. Does anyone recognise this description? Is it Earl Soham Lodge, Cretingham Lodge or The Rectory or perhaps another of our larger houses.

Mobile phones have been around for about 30 years now, in one form or another. In that time, they have been completely transformed and completely transforming.

As the great brick-like contraptions that became synonymous with the social and economic changes of the 1980s gave way to the sleek, allencompassing smart phones of today, so the way people have used them has changed beyond recognition, and the impact on our lives of those changes has been dramatic and, on the whole, hugely beneficial.

While almost anything and everything can be done via your mobile phone, its original purpose remains fundamental: the ability to make a phone call; to speak to other people.

It is in this area that technology just hasn't kept up. In Suffolk, as elsewhere, mobile phone reception is extremely mixed. It seems extraordinary that it's possible to speak to someone, with complete clarity, living thousands of miles away, and yet struggle to make a call from many of the towns and villages across our county.

It is in that context that the 'No More Not Spots' campaign has been launched by the British Chamber of Commerce, and strongly supported by the CEO of Suffolk's Chamber of Commerce, John Dugmore. As John rightly said, "It's particularly important in Suffolk because we have a number of key strategic arteries such as the A12 and A14 with terrible not-spot areas."

I'm sure we can all add to that with the areas we've struggled to make or take a phone call. Quite simply, we must do better.

Both for existing businesses, and to attract and encourage new ones, this is a must. Suffolk has such great economic potential, but in a highly-competitive world, we need to keep advancing, in order to retain and build on our competitive advantages.

The aim of the campaign is to encourage people to share the details of not -spots they have experienced – which you can do via the Chambers of Commerce website. The Chamber will then take these details to the big network operators, as well as councils and the government, with the laudable aim of achieving 100% coverage by 2020.

We can all do our bit, and I will certainly push this matter with my colleagues in Parliament. So, spread the word and #shareyournotspots.

If you are retired, or about to retire, beware: brain function declines rapidly as soon as people stop work and decide to put their feet up.
