Dear Friends

G. K. Chesterton famously said, "When people stop believing in God, that doesn't mean they believe in nothing, it means they will believe in anything."

A fascinating program on the radio recently surveyed people who say that they are atheists but at the same time are happy to talk about their experiences of angels and ghosts. When young people in particular ticked the "no religion" box in a recent national survey, that seemed to indicate a rejection of institutional religion (usually experienced as rather judgemental and repressive) but those same young people were happy to construct all kinds of beliefs in the supernatural, and some spoke quite literally of their freedom to make up beliefs - often involving ghosts and spirits - which they found comforting.

It reminded me of those who claim to be "spiritual but not religious", which can be rather self-indulgent, without any ethical demands. I am free to construct my own religion (which mustn't be called that) which suits my own desires.

I suppose one might ask, "Well what's the harm?" But for me, it raises three issues.

Firstly, the experiences or perceptions of institutional religion which these youngsters have is very negative. This is hardly surprisingly, when any character in any TV drama who professes any kind of Christian belief is usually portrayed as hopelessly naive or a bigot. No wonder this is rejected. It seems we have a real job of work to do to counteract these stereotypes.

Secondly, this kind of made-up religion usually makes no ethical demands on the individual, and is simply self-indulgent. Then our ethics have to come from somewhere else.

Thirdly, whatever happened to the quest for truth at the heart of all religion? All that seems to matter now is whether it works for me. I may be deluded, but at least I'm happy - for now.


If I believe that my deceased relative is literally still sitting in his chair in the living room, or my child who died is literally communicating with me through a robin in my garden, I can't help wondering how sustainable this is and whether the grief it conceals will at some point erupt. Is it all part of our reluctance to face the reality of death and of loss?

In my experience, most people come to church not to be told what to believe, but to find meaning and purpose in their lives. We can tap into centuries of experience of wrestling with the ultimate questions without having to reinvent the wheel or to make it up as we go along. The church has long experience of facing the reality of death and has developed liturgies to help people through the process of grief and bereavement. That is why at times of national outpourings of grief at some terrible atrocity (or national celebrations at a time of great joy) people turn to the church - often one of our great cathedrals - and the church handles it in ways born of long experience and deep understanding. The same is true of every service in a local church. It is a pity if people feel the only resource they have is something much shallower and insubstantial, or think they have to make something up themselves. We owe it to our young people to accentuate the positive or they will continue to tick the 'no religion' box and turn to those only too ready to exploit their ignorance.

They shall not grow old

They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old: age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them.



About 20 years ago I had been to the local war memorial on Remembrance Sunday and had been thinking about the names which had been read out. Our memorial just lists names and initials. So, I set out to discover more information about these men.

There are other memorials in the village including a roll of names in the church porch and these had more detail such as which unit the men served in. I published an appeal for information and people came forward with photographs, memories and letters. I also read local newspapers and found articles on the village and notices about the men.

The Commonwealth Graves Commission has a lot of information on the casualties. I searched under the name of the local village. Sometimes it was difficult, as some surnames are commoner than others. In those days you had to pay a fee and send a request by letter but now the database is simple to use online.

Some of the local men had emigrated to the Empire before the war and had enlisted there. The war records held in Canada, Australia and New Zealand are much better preserved and accessible than in this country.

I enjoyed visiting people who proudly showed off their family treasures of medals, letters and memories. 20 years ago, there were people who remembered casualties from the Second World War and even someone who recalled a man who had been gassed in the First World War. A special shed was built for him, which rotated so he had access to fresh air.

What was special for me was putting first names to men only known previously by an initial and then guessing they were known as Bill or Fred rather than William or Frederick.

In the time leading up to Remembrance Sunday why not visit your local memorial? If it is well looked after and free of litter and weeds, then why not write to whoever looks after it and thank them? If not, then find out who is responsible and ask some questions.

Teaching Languages at Earl Soham Primary School

Our motto at Earl Soham Primary School is "A community, learning together supporting each other and celebrating success". We talk about what this means on a regular basis but more importantly, we put it into practice all the time. The children drum roll on their legs in the weekly sharing assembly while waiting in anticipation for the announcement of each classes' "Stars of the Week". Yesterday in yellow class the children broke into a spontaneous round of applause for a classmate who wanted to sing a song in French, a brave move by anyone's standards! Our older children have welcomed and played with the new reception children with real affection and care and I felt at home the moment I arrived in September 2015.

We talk a lot about our school community but we also recognise that, as small and beautifully tucked away as we are, we are also part of a wider national and global society. It is with this in mind that when I arrived I started to teach French in Yellow Class (Years 3 and 4) on a weekly basis. I was also motivated by my love of France and all things French. Modern foreign languages is so often a subject that has to be squeezed in the primary curriculum with the result that many children arrive at high school with little or no exposure to a different language or culture. The result is often that they do not see a further language qualification as a viable choice at GCSE. We want the children who come to Earl Soham to feel that this is an entirely possible choice. We are happy to have strong links with the language department at Thomas Mills High school and have welcomed pupils from year nine who have taught excellent and exciting lessons to our children on several occasions.

Last year we gained the Bronze Linguamarque certificate and hope to start working towards the silver this year. Each child has a language portfolio that goes with them through the school. We focus on conversation, singing, playing games and integrating other languages into our daily routines. Last year we answered the register in a different language each month as well as learning some basic phrases and will be starting this again after half term. While there is an obvious focus on language skills including speaking, listening and pronunciation the children are also exposed to the cultures and traditions of other countries (with food being everyone's favourite way of immersing themselves!). With this in mind, we are hoping to take blue class on a visit to The Lemon Tree in Framlingham in order for them to practise their ordering skills with a native French speaker – the next best thing to a trip to France.

If you or someone you know has a love of or experience of living in another country and would like to come and speak to the children, we would love to hear from you.





Harvest Supper

I think it fair to say that autumn has certainly arrived — although we have been enjoying mainly mild and sunny days, the evening temperatures are noticeably cooler and the shorter days herald the arrival of longer, darker nights.

But it's easy to see why the arrival of autumn and winter, for some, can mean more prolonged periods of loneliness and isolation. One of the things that makes me particularly proud to represent this area of the country is that we are so lucky here in Suffolk to have such a strong sense of community spirit and inclusion. I especially enjoy meeting so many dedicated volunteers and visitors at the regular coffee mornings and social events that take place throughout Central Suffolk and North Ipswich. Community events such as these provide a vital lifeline for those living in a rural county like Suffolk, bringing together like minded friends and ensuring that local communities stay connected and in touch with one another.

Loneliness and isolation can often be associated with poor mental health; Wednesday 10th October was World Mental Health Day and I was encouraged to learn about *Time to Change*'s simple but effective "Ask Twice" initiative. The initiative is aiming to change the way we all think and act about mental health problems and although attitudes and behaviour are slowly changing towards mental ill health, there is much more to be done to break down the stigma so often attached. None of us think twice about seeking medical advice or help for a physical illness or injury, but with mental ill health, many people are still too proud to seek help, or don't consider mental health to be relevant to them.

When most of us ask a friend, colleague or loved one "How are you?", the usual and expected response is "Fine, thanks." But the reality is that we can all be guilty of saying we're fine when we're not. With one in four people experiencing a mental health problem this year alone, it seems pretty clear that many of us are saying we're fine when we're not. That's why the "Ask Twice" campaign is encouraging us to simply ask our friends, colleagues and loved ones twice if they are ok. Leading such busy lives, time is often at a premium, but the simple act of asking twice shows that we really are willing to listen.

Whilst it's clear to see that much has been achieved so far in raising awareness of mental ill health and the stigma that surrounds it, there is also much more to be done and I will continue to do all that I can to fight for more money for better mental health services here in Suffolk.


HARVEST SUPPER.
