Dear friends

Lent, Holy Week and Easter. It is an intense period for those who take the Christian calendar seriously. Lent is popularly about 'giving something up', though we really want to talk about taking something on - perhaps attending a Lent course, going to a Holy Week service or, for some, reading a devotional book. Easter is the climax of course - the most important festival of the Christian year, though perhaps eclipsed by Christmas in popular culture.

The season should appeal particularly to those who have been going through a difficult time recently for one reason or another. The church's seasons mirror our experiences. We move from the awareness of our own mortality on Ash Wednesday, through the darkness of Good Friday to the triumph of Easter Day, stopping off en route for a bit of light relief on Mothering Sunday, and the important but short-lived celebration of Palm Sunday.

Christians are sometimes described as 'Easter People'. God's raising of Jesus from the dead tells us in whose hands we are held, even in death. The New Testament writers try to spell out what that means, and St Paul in particular uses analogies of seeds and plants to try to convey something of resurrection, but it should be sufficient for us to know that God's love for us is absolute and infinite and doesn't cease, both in life and in death.

Patricia Jean Lettin

Over 100 people attended the funeral service at St Peter's Church in Cretingham conducted with sensitivity by the Reverend Wendy Gourlay on 25th February.

Patricia Lettin was born in 1932 in a terraced house in East London where the Olympic Park now stands. She and her family were dug out of the rubble from the bombed house during the blitz.

She left school at the age of 14 (the norm in those days) and on the recommendation of her headmaster was employed by a firm of West End solicitors. In a short time she became the personal assistant of the senior Partner, where she remained until after her marriage to a medical student who she had known from before the war, a marriage that lasted for 65 years.

During that time Pat provided constant support and encouragement to her partner, consultant orthopaedic surgeon at Bart's and RNOH, and over the years as wife of the Master of a City Livery Company, President of the British Orthopaedic Association and Vice President of the Royal College of Surgeons. Where her friendship, kindness, loyalty and charm were appreciated.

The loss of a teenage daughter and a lifetime caring for an autistic son did not deprive two further sons of a sound upbringing or six grandchildren and one great grandson of a caring grand mother.

After retiring to Moat Farm in 1996, Pat very much enjoyed village events, but her attendance gradually became limited as a result of failed spinal surgery, hip joint replacement, diabetes and its vascular and visual complications, rectal cancer and heart failure, which eventually made her house bound but she never once complained.

Earl Soham School Pupils take part in RSPB Schools' Garden Birdwatch

On Monday 28th January pupils of Earl Soham Primary School braved the cold, put on their hats and coats, and took it in turns to stay very still and count birds for the RSPB Garden Birdwatch. Armed with bird spotter books, binoculars and overwhelming enthusiasm the children were soon pointing out birds to Mrs Exton (Eco-schools co-ordinator) who quickly noted them down as they flew in to help themselves to the range of bird treats generously provided by parents. After 1 hour, which involved 42 children taking it in turns to watch for 10 minutes at a time, 9 different species had been spotted; this included 10 long-tailed tits that thrilled the children with their gradual increasing appearance. The Children in Yellow Class then wrote some 'Just So stories' about the birds that they saw. An example is shown below:

Once upon a time a very long time ago, I mean a very, very long time ago, all the birds in the world were blind. That meant they couldn't hunt and would soon go extinct. EARL SOHAM COMMUNITY PRIMARY SCHOOL

As everyone working, living with and helping Year 6 children will be only too well aware, the dreaded Key Stage 2 SATs are looming in May. It is a stressful time for all involved. A survey in the Guardian in 2017 reported that 8 out of the 10 primary school leaders interviewed reported marked increase in anxiety, panic attacks and sleeplessness amongst pupils.

Whilst SATs are important they are not the 'be all and end all' and that all that is required of the children is that they do the best they can. It is good to note that under the forthcoming OFSTED framework far more emphasis is being put on progress and less on absolute outcomes. I think most of us would say 'about time' – it is the whole child that matters not the outcome of one test on one particular day.

Children need to feel prepared but at Earl Soham we do not believe in teaching to the exams but try to encourage a wide and creative curriculum. We try to take some of the strain out of the process by making children familiar with the way the exams work in advance so that, on the day, it does not come as a bolt from the blue. It has been shown that the level of stress a child feels is inversely proportional to the outcome, so keeping the whole exercise relatively low key both at home and at school is important. In surveys many children have said that the fear of letting their parents/teachers down is one of the greatest causes of anxiety. We all need to reassure them and convey as little of any anxiety we may feel as possible. Children are very perceptive and will pick up on it.

Whilst it is stating the obvious – sleeping and eating well really do help as does talking through any specific worries or concerns a child may have.

In summary (from https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/stress-anxiety-depression/ coping-with-exam-stress/)

Watch for signs of stress. ..

Make sure your child eats well. ...

Help your child get enough sleep. ...

Be flexible during exams. ...

Help them to study. ...

Talk about exam nerves. ...

Encourage exercise during exams. ...

Don't add to the pressure.

At the end of February, I was delighted to welcome a delegation of farmers from Suffolk, all of whom were attending as part of a group of National Farmers' Union (NFU) members, led by Suffolk County Chairman, Glenn Buckingham. A special meeting was held in Westminster, where the farmers were able to directly put across their concerns collectively to Suffolk's MPs. Not surprisingly, most expressed concern about how agricultural policy will be affected as Britain draws ever closer to leaving the European Union. Other shared concerns included tariffs, animal welfare standards, food traceability, environmental practice, food production costs, availability of seasonal and migrant labour and the future

of water abstraction licenses. Alongside my Parliamentary colleagues, I also heard first-hand members' concerns about the recent increase in illegal hare-coursing, resulting in significant trespass and damage to land and property. Often perceived as a low-key activity, hare-coursing is a highly organised, lucrative affair, with high stakes and organised gambling. The Government is clear that responsibility for tackling this issue lies with local police forces and commendably, Suffolk Constabulary are doing all that they can to tackle this issue head on. I remain keen to support the farming community in their pursuits to stop this cruel, illegal and barbaric practice, and I will continue to do all that I can to support them in the fight against rural crime. My colleagues and I were also urged to support NFU-proposed amendments to the Agriculture Bill, which would put food production front and centre of future Government policies and ban imports of food produced in ways that would be illegal, or to lower standards than those required of British farmers. We already know that Britain is a world-leader in high standards of animal welfare, environmental protection and food safety and quite rightly, Suffolk's farmers voiced their concerns about not allowing food to be imported into this country post-Brexit which may compromise those standards.

Central Suffolk and North Ipswich is a predominantly rural constituency and with so many jobs being dependent on the agricultural sector, I am a great supporter of our local farmers and regularly meet with the NFU and the farming community to keep abreast of the important work being carried out across this sector. It's always helpful to hear first-hand the challenges faced and to offer my help in raising awareness or addressing their concerns when necessary.
