Dear friends

If someone called on you on the first day of February and they found you still had your Christmas decorations up they would probably think you were a bit eccentric to say the least. Yet our cathedrals and some of our braver parish churches would still have their nativity scenes at least on display. That is because the season of Christmas and then Epiphany continue until the second of February, when Candlemas arrives, and with it a new season.

'Candlemas' is a slightly archaic term these days, and the Christian calendar often refers to it as 'The Presentation of Christ in the Temple'. It commemorates the event which, according to Luke's Gospel, took place forty days after Jesus's birth, as the Jewish law required. It also involved the 'purification' of Mary his mother something which all Jewish women had to go through following childbirth.

Where the rite is kept, as the name implies, it involves a lot of lighted candles being blessed and processed, and the celebration of the Mass. These days we're not generally so keen on these 'purification' rites and focus more on thanksgiving for the gift of a child. A safe birth often prompts instinctive feelings of thankfulness - perhaps towards the medical staff in particular who have facilitated the delivery. For some, that healthy instinct goes even further and thanks God simply for the gift and mystery of life itself. That must surely be worth the lighting of a candle.

At Earl Soham Primary School we very much believe that education is about providing a wide variety of opportunities to learn. This also involves the provision of opportunities beyond our normal curriculum. Towards the end of the summer term 2018 I was made aware, by a parent, of an opportunity to offer instrumental music tuition. This resulted in a demonstration of several instruments for pupils followed by an information meeting for parents. As is often the case there was a need for parents and pupils to make a firm commitment to the programme which involved some fees along with the cost of obtaining an instrument.

12 pupils from Key Stage 2 took up the offer and the first lessons with their tutor took place shortly after the autumn half term break. All of them have been incredibly enthusiastic and they have been practising regularly at home. Indeed, on the day when their instruments are in school they often use the lunch hour to practice together.

Just before the Christmas break we hold a very popular service in our village church. This year parents, relatives and friends were treated to tunes played by our saxophonists and flutists alongside clarinet and cornet players. It was truly amazing to see just how far they had all progressed in just a few short weeks. As always regular practice and commitment had paid off. Who knows? May be one of them will go on to be a professional musician. Certainly they are developing a true love of music and of being able to play an instrument.

Maintenance and repairs to our church are becoming ever more costly and the Fabric Fund badly needs all our support. Please help if you can by supporting these events, catching up with old friends and meeting new ones. Everyone is most welcome.

JOIN THE ENVELOPE SCHEME!

We are very shortly going to launch a new 'Envelope Scheme' in Charsfield. This is to encourage people to give regular financial support to their parish church without having to sign up to anything! **How does it work?**

Everyone who wishes to participate gets their own personal box of 52 offertory envelopes - one for each Sunday of the year, starting on 7th April. These blue boxes will be available in the church throughout March for people to collect and take away. Simply put your offering in a separate dated envelope each week at home, and either bring it/them with you whenever you come to church, or, if you prefer, someone from the church can collect your filled envelopes every few weeks. That's all there is to it! To recoup the initial cost of the envelopes we are asking people to contribute £3 for their box. Each box has its own unique number (from one to twenty) stamped on every envelope so that we know who has them when it comes time for a new set, and also so that those who are able can sign a Gift Aid form to enable us to recoup the tax paid. There will be a sheet next to the boxes for people to write their contact details against their number. We do hope you will join the scheme to help secure the future of your parish church. SFB

Charsfield Parish Council Report

Speeding Sign

Charsfield is now the owner of a flashing speed sign which can be deployed in suitably identified sites around the village. You may have noticed it in operation over the past few days.

Is there an area near you where you think it would be of benefit?

We need people to act as custodians for 1-2 days at a time. This involves securing the sign with a chain and padlock in a suitable location for a few hours at a time and recharging the battery after use. All volunteers will be covered by the Parish Council insurance. Grit boxes

There is currently only one grit box in Charsfield which is kindly manned by Phillip Kindred. We are considering the provision of grit boxes where St Peters Close and South View Crescent adjoin The Street. This would cover most areas not included in the council gritting programme but if you have identified other danger areas please contact us and we will investigate.

However, we need volunteers to man the grit boxes. This entails spreading the grit and notifying the parish clerk when they need replenishing. Anyone undertaking these duties will be covered by Suffolk Coastal District Council insurance. If you can help please contact the Parish Clerk on 01473 737655 or email as above.

Telephone kiosk

We have received a quotation of $\pounds 1200$ for sandblasting and repainting the kiosk in situ. Although this is a very competitive price it represents a large proportion of the precept – your money.

Before we proceed with this work we need to know whether or not it is what the village wants. Numerous appeals have not produced any offers of help from you to carry out the work as a village on a voluntary basis and we have had only two suggestions for its future use: A temporary exhibition area and a book exchange scheme.

The kiosk is an eyesore at the moment and if it is restored the Parish Council want to ensure ease of future maintenance so it needs to be done properly. The alternative will be to sell it and clear the site.

Debach and Boulge WW1 Centenary

On a dry, pleasant winters' afternoon on Sunday the 9th of December, villagers from, and visitors to, Debach gathered at a new site for a service led by Canon Revd. Clare Saunders to dedicate an oak tree to commemorate the centenary of the end of WW1 and in particular, remembrance of the fallen soldiers of Debach and Boulge.

The position of the oak tree and new handcrafted elm bench are on the cleared site of the old village reading room (which fell onto disrepair in the 1960s) and apparently is the site of a chapel dating from the early 19th Century.

The site is on the edge of Boulge Parish and borders fields owned by Gressingham Foods. With kind permission of the Buchanan family, the site was identified and indeed the heavy clearing work was undertaken by Gressingham employees. Keith and Julian Banthorp finished clearing and setting out the site, the elm bench was hand carved by Julian.

The service of dedication was led by Clare with readings from villagers ,and ending with a poignant and fitting tribute from Phillip Hunt, born in Boulge and whose father George, knew and talked often of one of the fallen soldiers from Boulge, James Knights.

Tea and cakes at Beaconsfield Cottages ended a memorable occasion.

Plans for a notice board to be erected at the site, with the full names, regiment and resting place of soldiers from Debach and Boulge of both World Wars are under way and hopefully in place by Spring 2019.

Thank you to Clare for leading the service, to Beth Taylor (Village Chairperson) and Tony Fryatt for their support with the project, and special thanks to Maurice Buchanan, Keith and Julian Banthorp for the planning, the work and completion of the project.
