What does the word 'Evangelism' mean to you? What we have to do, though, is put aside those slightly embarrassing conceptions and think in terms of drawing people - including ourselves - towards faith. In practical terms, for us, that means drawing people towards the church, where they are likely to find others who take their Christianity seriously. The best thing to do is think of what drew you into Christian faith and into the life of the church and then work out how that might be achieved nowadays. We ourselves might be able to be metaphorical bridges which people can use to find their way into the worshipping community. It can happen through church social events, special services, or casual conversations. We may be surprised how many people there are out there who are looking for meaning and purpose in their lives, and a friendly community to join. If you are a baptised Christian, then you have all the gualifications needed to do the job and nudge people in the right direction. They will live to thank you. With best wishes

76 Allied prisoners broke out of the Stalag Luft III prisoner-of-war camp near Sagan, Germany after digging tunnels. 73 were recaptured and 50 executed. The event was dramatised in the classic film *The Great Escape*.

60 years ago, on $9^{\rm th}$ March 1959 that the Barbie doll was launched at the International Toy Fair in New York City, USA.

50 years ago, on 4th March 1969 that British gangsters Ronald and Reginald Kray (the Kray twins) were found guilty of murdering the criminals Jack McVitie ('Jack the Hat') and George Cornell. They were sentenced to life imprisonment.

40 years ago, on 26th March 1979 that The Camp David Peace Accord was signed by Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, ending 30 years of war.

30 years ago, on $12^{\rm th}$ March 1989 that Tim Berners-Lee invented the World Wide Webb while working at CERN.

By law a complete new Electoral Roll is prepared for each parish every six years and this is due in 2019. The old Roll cannot be carried forward.

All those whose name is on the current electoral roll will receive this letter inviting them to complete an application form to be entered on the new Roll

First, the system is intended to enable church people at every level to be in touch with the Church as a whole and to play their part in decision-making.

Secondly, the system is intended to ensure that the laity have their place in every aspect of church life, including its doctrine and services.

The World Wide Web - 30 years on

The World Wide Web was invented 30 years ago this month, on 12th March 1989, by Tim Berners-Lee while he was working at CERN, the European particle physics laboratory.

His innovation – a global hypertext document system originally described by his superior as "vague but exciting" – was intended to help scientists share data across a then obscure platform called the Internet, but his decision to make the source code freely available meant it took on a life of its own and is now used by almost everyone with a computer.

He has never profited directly from his invention, but now spends much of his time trying to protect it from malign influences and is working on Solid, a project designed to provide *"true data ownership as well as improved privacy"*.

As a result of his original invention, Berners-Lee was named one of the 20th century's most important figures by *Time* magazine, received the prestigious Turing Award for achievements in the computer sciences, and was honoured at the Olympics. He was also knighted by the Queen.

Raised as an Anglican, he turned away from religion but then became an active member of the Unitarian Universalist Church, which he describes as tolerant and liberal. *Parish Pump*

JOIN THE ENVELOPE SCHEME!

We have now launched a new 'Envelope Scheme' in Charsfield. This is to encourage people to give regular financial support to their parish church without having to sign up to anything!



How does it work?

Everyone who wishes to participate gets their own personal box of 52 offertory envelopes - one for each Sunday of the year, starting on 7th April. These blue boxes are now available in the church and will be throughout March for people to collect and take away. Simply put your offering in a separate dated envelope each week at home, and either bring it/them with you whenever you come to church, or, if vou prefer, someone from the church can collect your filled envelopes every few weeks. That's all there is to it! To recoup the initial cost of the envelopes we are asking people to contribute £3 for their box. Each box has its own unique number (from one to twenty) stamped on every envelope so that we know who has them when it comes time for a new set, and also so that those who are able can sign a Gift Aid form to enable us to recoup the tax paid. There will be a sheet next to the boxes for people to write their contact details against their number when they take their box. We do hope you will join the scheme to help secure the future of your parish church. SFB

EVERYDAY MEALS ON A BUDGET

BOLOGNESE BAKE Serves 6

400g Lean Minced Beef 3 garlic cloves, crushed 1 tbsp Castor Sugar 1 tbsp Dried Mixed Italian Herbs 690ml Jar Passata with onions and garlic 350g Penne Pasta 200ml tub half-fat Crème Fraiche 25g parmesan, grated Garlic and salad, to serve



Heat grill to high. In a large, non-stick frying pan, fry the mince until browned. Add the garlic, sugar and herbs, and cook for one minute more. Pour over the passata, add seasoning, then simmer while you cook the pasta, following the pack instructions. Meanwhile, mix the crème fraiche and parmesan. Spoon half the mince into an oven proof dish. Mix the rest with the pasta and pour this on top. Drizzle over the parmesan cream and grill until golden and bubbling. Serve with salad and garlic bread.

Making sense of Lent

This month sees the start of Lent, the six-week period leading up to Easter. In the early Church, it was a time when new converts were instructed in the faith, ready for their baptism at Easter. Over the years, Lent has become a season of penitence, self-examination and fasting. Jesus began His earthly ministry by fasting in the wilderness for 40 days and taught his disciples to fast, *'when you fast..'* (Matthew 6:17).

Fasting might involve missing one or two meals in a day, refraining from TV or alcohol, or whatever gets in the way of us fully focusing on God. What are the reasons for fasting?

The act of giving up something is a tangible sacrifice to God, reminding us of our desire to put him first in our lives.

Giving up things I value shows me how depend I can be on other things rather than God.

Fasting helps me to surrender my '*idols*' to God. When fasting I am reminded of a deeper hunger and need for God in my life: '*Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.*' (Matthew 5:6). I learn to be more dependent on God, while releasing the stuff I depend on in my life.

Lent can also be a time to embrace new spiritual disciplines egg joining a study group, *'random acts of kindness'*, giving more time to prayer and Bible study Whatever you do, have a great Lent! *Parish Pump*

Psalm 63 - or how to cope with the pressures of daily life

If you had to describe our society in a single word, the most appropriate one would be *pressure*. We live with pressure in every aspect of life, from our school, work or family life, to the big issues facing our world.

King David knew what it meant to live under pressure. His son, Absalom, led a rebellion against him, resulting in David fleeing for his life into the wilderness of Judah. It was there that he wrote Psalm 63. **The psalm** demonstrates the priorities a person of God under pressure.

God my desire: 'You, God, are my God, earnestly I seek you; I thirst for you, my whole being longs for you, in a dry and parched land where there is no water.' (v1). David's physical thirst was an expression of his deeper thirst to know God. Even though separated from the worship of the sanctuary, he chose to seek God. When God seems distant or silence in our lives, we too can choose to seek him; this can be a vital path of growth in our relationship with him.

God my delight: 'Because your love is better than life, my lips will glorify you.' (3). David 's delight in God is expressed in praise, as he recognises God's love for him. What gives us delight in our lives? Does it come from the things of this world or from God himself?

God my defense: 'I cling to you; your right hand upholds me.' (8). David is surrounded by enemies, but confident in God's defense and purpose for him. God uses our troubles and disappointments to fulfil his will, as he develops our character and trust in his purposes.

'Don't worry about locating your purpose. If you are seeking after God, your purpose will locate you.' (Tony Evans). Parish Pump

As I sit to write this month's column, the first real cold snap of the year has brought us snow and ice, but thankfully bringing minimal disruption. I'd like to pay special tribute to our dedicated highways teams who are working, often in treacherous and freezing conditions, around the clock, to keep Suffolk's roads safe and accessible for all of us.

Living in a predominantly rural county like Suffolk, our road infrastructure is simply vital in connecting our rural communities and enabling those who live and work here to travel easily to and from school, our places of work, to visit friends and family and to access local services, such as hospital appointments or local facilities. That's why I am committed to doing all that I can to support our County Council colleagues and my fellow MPs in lobbying Government for much needed cash to improve and maintain our road network.

I was delighted that back in October, the Chancellor made an additional £420 million available for local authorities in England to spend on road maintenance. One of the most common issues coming through my mailbox and post-bag are issues relating to Highways complaints and I know that this money will deliver some much needed and real on-the-ground improvements to our road network here in Suffolk. I'm looking forward very much to visiting our dedicated Highways Team at Suffolk County Council soon to see how this money is being put to good use.

Working with our local councils and Chamber of Commerce, I have also helped to secure £3.8 million of Government funding for improvements to the A140 at Eye. This money has been awarded to Suffolk County Council to deliver the project and works are due to be completed by 31 March 2020. The A140 is a vital economic route and these improvements will go some way in helping to further boost the area's economic potential, not to mention vastly improving road safety on this busy and fast moving stretch of road.

Finally, alongside my fellow East Suffolk MPs and the Leader of Suffolk County Council, I was pleased to meet with Roads Minister, Jesse Norman, in pressing the urgent case for improvements to the A12 and more specifically, for a Four Villages Bypass. There has been a strong case for a Four Villages Bypass for many years now, but with such a bypass likely to cost in excess of £150 million, the funding requirement is significant and will require all those involved to work collaboratively in order to match fund any potential Government money.

I will continue to do all that I can to support our District and County Council colleagues in ensuring that Suffolk's needs, in terms of infrastructure, remain firmly on the Government's radar.
