Dear friends

They do say that in the army there are two things you should never discuss: politics and religion. Even good friends may differ quite vehemently. I don't have to mention the 'B' word to convey that we are in a period of huge differences of opinion. People hold strong views. In the life of the church, we are united by our common faith. We worship together, we can put on and attend social and fundraising events together, we can pray and study the bible together, we can share our worries and our celebrations and we can extend our pastoral care to all who need it. In fact, we can share much of our life together. We are actually quite experienced at focusing on those things that unite us and avoiding those things which we sense may divide us; and there is nothing wrong with that. Confrontation and argument for its own sake is actually quite pointless. Those who wanted to make trouble for Jesus tried to goad him into confrontation with the Roman rulers (that business with the coin bearing Caesar's head) and with the Jewish religious authorities (over healing on the Sabbath). In both cases, he refused to be drawn into pointless confrontation and instead exposed the motives of those who were trying to trip him up, and said something helpful at the same time. No-one could accuse Jesus of not caring about society, nor of not holding strong beliefs, he clearly did both. But he was able to express both without alienating anyone unnecessarily. Others may have tried to pick a fight with him, but he never responded in kind. By all means, we can all hold whatever views we wish about the issues we currently face, but we can also remain focused, as Jesus did, on treating people with kindness - particularly those whom we suspect may hold views very different from our own. I witness such skill, practice and sensitivity in our church communities all the time. Long may it continue. Best wishes

Ena was born on 19th Aug 1931, at Hove in Sussex. She was the eldest of three children having a sister, Betty and a brother, Jack. As a young woman Ena did secretarial work in London.

Ena and Patrick met at a young farmers club, which have a reputation as a marriage bureau. They married on Valentines day in 1953. They moved about a lot with Patrick's work in agriculture, and lived for a time in Monmouthshire, Hertfordshire and Surrey before finally moving to Suffolk. Ena and Patrick had three sons, Andrew, Paul and Richard. Ena was a full time mum when the boys were growing up. I remember Ena telling me how much she enjoyed the time she spent feeding three hungry boys and washing sports kits etc. and all the things that go with bringing up a family. Andrew, Paul and Richard went on to marry Margaret, Julie and Katrina, and Ena was blessed with six grandchildren and one great grandchild. I know that Ena was very proud of her family

While living at Barham and then Henley, Ena trained as a lay reader, she also worked as a teaching assistant at Charsfield Primary School and later as a secretary at Diocesan House. Ena and Patrick also worked for the Samaritans for about ten years. Moving to Framlingham in the late eighties. As a lay reader Ena worked in the benefice firstly with Richard Addington then Betty Mockford and finally with Stephen Brian. Ena became a great asset to all of us involved in the church, leading all forms of worship, her personal favorite being Iona worship. Ena took up the role of benefice magazine editor, which she did with great enthusiasm for about twenty years. Ena and Patrick also served on the Parochial Church Council of Dallinghoo and later of Hoo, where she was secretary, they were very grateful for all that she did for them. Ena was a valued part of the ministry team, she had a sense of humour, was resilient, forthright and perceptive. Several years ago Ena led a year-long Way ahead group in the benefice which sowed the seed, which was nurtured and encouraged by others, for my journey to ordained ministry.

Due to Patrick's and her own failing health Ena gave up her active ministry three years ago. Ena cared for Patrick at home in Framlingham until he went into Pear Tree Lodge in Knodishall, where she joined him later. Over this time when Ena was unable to drive, Wendy was a loyal friend, taking her shopping and to church services. Later visiting her at Knodishall.

I would like to talk about Psalm 23, written by David. Before becoming king David was a humble shepherd. In the Psalm David tells us about the world he knew and used it to explain his relationship with God. He says "the Lord is my shepherd I shall not want." God is the good shepherd.

David was making the point that he was no longer the leader in his life, but that he had put his complete trust in following God as his shepherd. He had made God the shepherd of his life.

This was true of Ena, she embraced having a relationship with Jesus Christ. Ena was a very strong woman, but as strong as she was she came to realize that she could never be strong enough on her own, she needed God's help.

If we allow God to be the shepherd in our lives through trusting in Jesus Christ as Lord, we can have peace, as David writes, "Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil." Why? Because we will dwell in the house of the Lord forever. Thankyou Ena for helping us know that God is love

EARL SOHAM COMMUNITY PRIMARY SCHOOL

A parent's view of sharing assembly

Every Friday morning at Earl Soham Community Primary School, parents are invited to attend an assembly where they can share in the busy week of the school and celebrate the achievements of the children.

A 'Star of the Week' certificate is given out for both maths and writing in each of the three classes. These awards recognise a child's personal achievement, rather than comparing them against their peers. Each award winner reads out a bit of their work or talks about what they have done at the front of the assembly with the Headteacher, Mr Lambillion-Jameson, who is always enthusiastic and positive about their achievements. Quite often we have children from the oldest class using the whiteboard to show us how they solved their maths problem. Talking in front of their peers and adults builds confidence, which I see clearly both in my own children and in watching the other children develop as they move up the school.

There are many things I get out of coming to assembly. Of course I feel proud when my children are given a certificate, but it is much more than that: I feel I get to know the other children and the school staff much better. Teachers and Teaching Assistants talking about what they have been doing and why that specific child deserves the award shows the passion they bring to teaching and how much they know and care about the children. It has occasionally even brought tears to my eyes. The assembly connects me to the school and I know I am not alone in genuinely celebrating the achievements of other children, especially when we see something we know is amazing for them. This can be as simple reading out their work in assembly where previously they haven't been able to we celebrate this together. Sometimes we are surprised by something totally different - the children once created a thunderstorm for us, starting off with just a few children finger clicking for the lightest rain and building up to the full thunderstorm before slowly returning to quiet. I can't do it justice in words but it was wonderfully creative and showed the whole school working together.

I haven't space to mention the times-table raffle or the recognition of sports participation but I wanted to talk about the values awards (one value, such as being kind or being prepared, is chosen as a focus each week). Recently, instead of three certificates, one for each class, there were four, which quite surprised the Headteacher. Probably even more surprising for him was that he was the recipient of the extra one. The eldest class had decided that he was such a good role model of calmness that he deserved an award for being calm - a lovely little illustration of the community and atmosphere of the school. Insights like this help make assembly very special for those of us who are lucky enough to be able to attend. For those unable to do so, there are photos posted on the school website.

Dear Villagers

For some time now your Parish Councillors have been looking at the possibility of obtaining an electronic speed indicating device (SID) for use in Cretingham. We are sure you have seen examples of these in surrounding villages and they are a proven method of reducing the speed of cars travelling in through our country lanes. We have been assured of financial support from our local County Councillor and we will also be accessing some Community Infrastructure Funding made available to us as a result of the new housing that has been built recently in the village. There would, therefore, be no need for any additional cash to be raised through the Parish Precept element of Council Tax or other local fundraising. There are, inevitably, regulations around where the SID can be placed - at least 100metres inside the statutory speed limit boundary; away from multiple private driveways wherever possible; with a clear line of sight to the traffic flow. We would hope to utilise two locations - one to use the existing 30mph repeater sign between Kittles Corner and Corner Farm and one between Corner Farm and Hill House. We propose to ask for bi-directional mounting frames so

that the SID can be used facing (broadly) both north or south at each of the two locations.

We have copies of the paperwork available for anyone who wishes to examine it and we will be discussing this matter further at the next Parish Council meeting on Thursday 9th May at 7.30pm in Monewden Village Hall. Like all Parish Council meetings this one is open to everyone to attend and, at the Chairman's invitation, to comment on the matters being discussed. Please contact us if you are unable to attend the meeting but have a view on this matter you would like considered.

We hope you will give this proposal your support and we look forward to hearing from you.

Missed appointments with your GP

If you can't make an appointment, do you warn your surgery? Too many of us forget to do so: missed appointments with our GPs cost £216million a year – the equivalent of 2,325 full-time family doctors. No wonder that NHS England is urging people to cancel rather than simply not show up.

Sadly, more than 15million GP practice appointments – one in 20 – are wasted every year as patients failed to attend without cancelling. As one doctor points out: "It can be a frustrating waste of resources for GPs, and also for other patients who are struggling to secure an appointment for themselves. We would urge people to let us know if they can't attend as soon as possible, so that we can offer that time to someone else who really needs it." (Parish Pump)
