Dear friends

This time had to come sooner or later, and now this will be my last magazine letter. The rest of August will be spent getting rid of a great deal of stuff as we prepare to downsize into our retirement house in Surrey, and packing for the day we move, which looks like it will probably be the 27th of August.

The thirteen years we have been here has been by far the longest either of us has lived anywhere since each of us was eighteen. Even in my previous life as a teacher I moved around the country every few years. Yet when asked how I like Suffolk, I have always said that this has been the best move I have ever made. It has been marvellous having such easy access to the countryside, and particularly enjoyable getting to know the people who make up our small communities. When I am out in my car or on my bike, travelling round the eight villages, there is always a good chance that I will know the people I see on the way. That is not the case in the big suburban or town parishes, but is one of the joys of rural ministry.

I have always felt hugely supported and appreciated in my ministry here, and have found people friendly and eager to do whatever they can to share in the life of the churches. I will take away many fond memories of all our friends in the Mid Loes Benefice, and I know Liz feels the same.

The future of this benefice is uncertain and new patterns of ministry will emerge in this and neighbouring benefices. But whatever happens, the Christian witness will continue in our parishes because that is where the real work is done. I should also mention what a delight it has been in recent years to see Kathleen Martin's ministry develop. She will continue as the curate, supported by Graham Hedger, whom many will know, who is now the rural dean and Kathleen's supervisor. Between them they will look after the baptisms, weddings and funerals during the interregnum, and I hope parishes will continue to work with Kathleen when it comes to the provision of services. We are also fortunate to have Wendy Gourlay on hand to help with the sacramental ministry in particular, and our able Lay Elders: Mary, Jo and Amber. However, we do currently have a lot of services in our benefice, considering the small size of our parishes and some of our congregations and the limited size of our ministry team, and the status quo may not be sustainable much longer. To coin a phrase, there may have to be a 'new normal' as we draw more into line with the rest of the diocese and cut our suit according to our cloth.

But I want to end on an upbeat note. I would like to express our thanks for the friendship, support and encouragement we have received at your hands. It has been a delight to serve this benefice as a minister of word and sacrament, and I will always feel privileged to have been the first (and probably last!) Rector of the Mid Loes Benefice.

My final service will be a Benefice Service at Dallinghoo on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> August at **11am**. PLEASE BRING A PICNIC! We are intending to hold the service outside, followed by a socially-distanced picnic. I look forward to seeing you there.

Lockdown has perhaps given us all the opportunity to rethink how we live our lives and what we value most about living and working in Suffolk. For me, I am incredibly proud of our rural heritage, the fantastic Suffolk countryside and the great community spirit that is evident in all our towns and villages.

As the COVID restrictions start to lift and our local shops and pubs have cautiously begun to reopen, we must now turn our attention to protecting jobs and supporting our economy to slowly start to recover. With smaller, independent retailers needing our support, it is perhaps more important than ever that we all take the opportunity to support our great Suffolk farmers, food producers and retailers, who have been working throughout the COVID pandemic ensuring that high quality, local produce is available in our local shops and communities.

Recently, there has been much interest in the matter of food safety and animal welfare standards and a number of you may have already been in touch with me directly. Contrary to media reports that UK food standards will be lowered as part of future trade deals, I want to reassure you that the Government will not compromise on our impeccably high standards of food production and animal welfare. The amendments which have been widely reported would consequently have created new trade barriers, potentially preventing the Government from being able to agree fair and mutually beneficial trade deals.

The UK's food standards, for both domestic production and import, are overseen by the Food Standards Agency and Food Standards Scotland. These are independent agencies and provide advice to the UK and Scottish Governments. They will continue to do so in order to ensure that all food imports comply with the UK's high safety standards. Decisions on these standards are a matter for the UK and will be made separately from any trade agreement.

Here in Suffolk, and around the UK, we should be proud of our world-leading food, health and animal welfare standards and we simply must not lower our standards as we negotiate new trade deals. Any trade deal the UK strikes must be fair and reciprocal to our farmers and must not compromise on our high environmental protection, animal welfare and food safety standards. I am therefore pleased that the Government has, in principle, agreed to the establishment of a Trade & Agriculture Commission. The Commission will ensure the importance of close engagement with the agricultural sector, which will help to inform, shape and guide our agricultural trade policy. This news been welcomed by the NFU, with whom I regularly meet, and I will continue to fight for the best interests of our farmers here in Suffolk.

## News from Charsfield C of E Primary School

Since the announcement of school closures on 20<sup>th</sup> March, the school has very much been a hive of activity, albeit slightly differently to how it normally would be! Throughout March, April and May the children were supported with home learning. This involved online lessons, virtual meetings, phone calls, emails and a lot of hard work from pupils, parents and staff alike.

On 1<sup>st</sup> June we were delighted to be able to welcome back our pupils from Reception, Year 1 and Year 6, whilst still supporting pupils in the other year groups with their home learning. From the 1<sup>st</sup> July we invited pupils from all year groups to return to school, should they wish to. We now have 2 groups (which are called bubbles) that work separately on the school site. We have still been able to provide a diverse curriculum with Music, French, Art, DT, Forest Schools, Mental Health and Wellbeing sessions, History, Geography as well as Maths and English. Our KS 1 bubble even managed to have a Pirate Day as part of their seaside theme where they set up a balance beam and had to "walk the plank!"

On Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> July we will be holding a sports afternoon as we were unable to hold our annual sports day. The children will design the different races they would like to take part in and each bubble will be able to support one another from a distance, as we are lucky enough to have a large playing field that we have been able to section off into zones. Pupils at home have been invited to hold their own sports afternoon on this day too.

For those pupils who have been unable to return to school at this time, they are still very much included in school life with home learning and support from the school still being given. Pupils in school and at home have been writing to each other, KS 1 pupils were invited to be a part of the Pirate Day and all pupils at home have been invited to take part in our sports afternoon by designing their own games and activities in their gardens.

# Where do children feel most lonely?

Children who grow up in the city are nearly four times more lonely than those who grow up in the countryside.

That is the finding of a recent official study into childhood loneliness. It found that 19.5 per cent of children in cities report 'often' feeling lonely, as opposed to just five per cent in towns or rural areas.

The Office for National Statistics also found that it could be linked to the fact that in the city, parents are more hesitant about letting children go out on their own.

As one doctor explained, "Despite easier access to people via social media, that doesn't seem to be helping in terms of loneliness. It emphasises the need for face to face contact and social support in a physical way."

# RIP GEORGE RUSHMORE 1929-2020

George was born in Ontario, Canada where his parents had gone to seek work in the depression. He was the youngest of four children and the family moved back to Ilford in Essex when he was still very young, but old enough to have picked up an accent and pronunciations which got him in trouble at school.

Like many people, his education was disrupted by the war, but he pursued a correspondence course to qualify as an accountant. He met Shirley when they were both working for the same firm in London and they married in Ilford in 1956.

He fathered a son in 1961 and a daughter followed a few years later while he was working for Hunts Agricultural Engineers in Earls Colne, Essex.

George progressed to become Company Secretary and a member of the board, but boardroom battles led him to leave once both children were safely off to university. George and Shirley sold up and took on Campsea Ashe Post Office Stores in Suffolk. Here they put into practice the policies he had been arguing for with the board. The Stores thrived, while Hunts went out of business.

Having built up and sold the business they then spent a very happy 10 years running a Bed & Breakfast business on the Isle of Skye. Each was able to play to their strengths, Shirley as the perfect hostess, George as witty raconteur and wind-up merchant.

The couple moved back to England in 1995, settling in Ashfield in 1996 where they remained until George's death in March 2020, the first Rushmore ever to reach the age of 90. Shirley still lives in the village today.

Due to Covid-19 restrictions there was no opportunity for a full funeral service, but Shirley and the family hope to be able to invite you all to a proper celebration of George's life once the ongoing relaxation of restrictions allows.
