CHRISTMAS RECIPE FOR YOU...

No-bake millionaire's chocolate cheesecake

Serves 10-12 75g butter, melted, plus extra for the tin 250g shortbread biscuits 250g mascarpone 300g full-fat soft cheese 50g icing sugar 40g cocoa powder 300ml double cream Half x 397gcan caramel or 200g dulce de leche 50g dark chocolate, chopped Star-shaped sprinkles or chocolate stars, to decorate

1 Butter the base of a 20cm springform cake tin and line with baking parchment. Blitzthe biscuits to fine crumbs, then add the butter and blitz again. Tip into the tin and press down firmly with the back of a spoon. Chill.

2 Combine the mascarpone, soft cheese, icing and cocoa until smooth. In a separate bowl, whip the cream until stiff, then fold into the mascarpone mix. Spoon over the biscuit base and level. Chill for 1 hour.

3 Warm the caramel in a pan until easily spreadable . Pour this over the cheesecake. , then spread out gently and chill until slightly



set. Meanwhile, melt the chocolate in a heatproof bowl set over a pan of simmering water, or in the microwave. Drizzle the melted chocolate back and forth over the caramel, then decorate with a sprinkle of stars. Chill until ready to serve. Remove from the tin, take off the baking parchment and transfer to a serving plate.

Earl Soham Village Hall - Update

Firstly, I hope that you are well in these most unusual times. As you will appreciate, the AGM for Earl Soham Village Hall (the "Village Hall"), which would ordinarily be held in April, has had to be postponed. We will look to hold a replacement meeting as soon as practicable, even if this ends up having to be via telephone or video conference. However, in the meantime, this update is designed to provide you with details which would otherwise have been discussed since the last AGM. This extended period has been a busy one in the life of the Village Hall, both in terms of events and behind the scenes fundraising efforts, and more recently with a programme of long-awaited improvements. Many thanks to all of you who have attended events before the enforced closure due to the worldwide pandemic (especially to those who have played some part in organising these) as well as those who have contributed (financially or otherwise). The Village Hall continues to be a focal point in the village and helps to bring extra life and spirit to our community which I am sure many will appreciate. As you will no doubt be aware, the Village Hall is currently closed once again after a short few week of being re-opened and will continue to be so for the foreseeable future. It will re-open again as soon as considered appropriate (and taking account of government guidelines). However, even with the Village Hall closed, the spirit of the community was very much alive, and we are delighted that so many of you are keeping in contact (...from a distance) and trying to help each other/the wider community. Hopefully you will find this update useful and if you have any questions about this, or indeed in respect of the Village Hall more generally, please do speak to one of the committee members.

Village Hall Committee: As a reminder, the Village Hall Committee currently consists of: Paul Perkins (Chair), Neil Warden (Vice Chair), Vacant (Secretary), Colin Melhuish (Treasurer) Lorna Perkins (Bookings Secretary/Hall Manager), Chris Pratt, Mary Vellacott, Mary Patterson Peter Russell, Candida Cook, Mike Pleasants Lorna Perkins takes responsibility for day-to-day operations of the Village Hall and special thanks must go to her for ensuring the smooth operation of the Village Hall. As a Committee, we are also very grateful to the various other subcommittees/friends of the Village Hall who do so much in organising events and participating in these.

Sadly, Neil and Colin have indicated that they wish to step down from the committee after several years of stellar service and will do so once Village Hall life returns to normal and we can ensure a smooth handover. They will be greatly missed from the Committee. If anyone else would like to join the Committee (or recommend a friend...) please do let us know. We are looking to fill the positions of treasurer, secretary, and vice chair at or the next AGM.

Update: This extended period has focussed largely on three areas: (1) community events; (2) fundraising efforts, and (3) a programme of improvements.

There have been so many wonderful events in the Village Hall including: •Dance Club •Film Club • Christmas coffee morning • Burns supper • Live band nights • Carpet Bowls, Art Club, Women's Institute, Cubs and Scouts. I know many of you have attended several of the events in the Village Hall and these continue to be well received and enjoyed by many in the village. As well as helping raise funds they have helped bring many people together (both in terms of organising and participating) and thanks must go to all involved. The addition of the Christmas coffee morning proved successful and was a welcome addition to the events calendar. The key aim/purpose of the Village Hall (as a charity, and so our responsibility as trustees) is to foster community spirit and interaction, and I hope that we are achieving this through hosting such events.

COVID-19 forced us to close the doors in March, but we supported the community by using the village hall as a food bank collection point, again an example of how the people of Earl Soham came together to support each other. It also provided an opportunity to progress plans to upgrade the facilities in the Village Hall (and so encourage/facilitate wider use by the community. For those who have been up to the Village Hall recently, you will have noticed changes in the grounds as well as redecorating under way both inside and outside. However, these 'cosmetic improvements' do not reflect the level of work that has been going on behind the scenes with important structural issues also being made good. A special mention must be given to Colin Melhuish who has worked tirelessly on this project (including the need to oversee the Government Guidelines for Covid-19 in the absence of a Secretary).

The intention was for work on the hall to be completed in time for re-opening on a full-time basis at the end of the first Lockdown. Sadly, unexpected problems resulted in delays and rising costs has meant that remaining work is being completed by a small 'working party'.

One positive, but 'hidden', development of note is that a new boiler was installed in 2019 and is already serving to reduce heat loss (and so heating costs).

Fundraising, as was apparent at the AGM last year, was proving increasingly difficult even before the onset of the coronavirus pandemic, with factors such as Brexit and general economic concerns reducing the number of funding options available to us. However, we have been grateful to the Parish Council for their annual contributions and for an unexpected ('no strings attached') Grant of £10,000 from a COVID-19 support fund. I would also like to mention the valuable contribution of over £300 each year from the '100 Club'.

Finances: The Treasurer will shortly be preparing a report to follow this update and to include both the financial year to 31st January 2020 and the income and expenditure for the period to 30 November encompassing the improvements to the Village Hall so far.

Going forward we hope to be upgrading the lighting and (subject to fundraising and grants) to build a new combined kitchen and toilet block to the rear of the hall, which, with the installation of a full internet connection with WIFI would bring the hall into the 21st century! However, a word of caution is required at this stage as a survey just carried out has indicated the need for the asbestos roof to be replaced within the 'foreseeable future', albeit this again should be good grounds for a successful grant application for the upgrade of a 1930's building in the heart of the village.

Conclusion: I hope that you find the above update useful. Formal matters ordinarily covered at the AGM such as election of the Committee and approval of 2019 AGM minutes will be completed at the 2020 AGM once a suitable date is selected. If you have any questions/comments in the meantime, please do let any of the Committee know. Thank you to everyone who supports the Village Hall in whatever form. Hopefully it will not be too long until we see the doors of the Village Hall open to everyone once again and village life return to normal. Thank you again for your continued support. DR DAN POULTER MP Member of Parliament for Central Suffolk and North Ipswich

As I sit to write this article, the Prime Minister has once more addressed the nation and we find ourselves in a second period of national lockdown.

As I write, infection rates in Suffolk remain relatively low, but the rest of the country is seeing a large growth both in terms of numbers of people infected and hospital admissions; even low incidence areas like Suffolk will face challenges with capacity in our NHS. It is a very difficult balancing act for the Government between protecting life and protecting the economy and on balance, I agree that, even here in Suffolk, a temporary nationwide lockdown makes sense.

It is vital that throughout lockdown, we protect jobs and our local economy, and a strong support package has been put in place by the Government for businesses and individuals. Locally, the **Suffolk Support and Advice Line** has been set up to help with financial and employment advice - **0800 068 3131**. In addition, the **Home But Not Alone** free phoneline has also been reactivated, supporting the most vulnerable in our communities and support is available via **0800 876 6926**. Both lines are staffed from 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday.

This will undoubtedly be a very different Christmas for all of us and this year, more than ever, we must remember those in our NHS and emergency services who work around the clock to keep people safe and cared for and to ensure help is at hand when needed. I will certainly be spending some of my Christmas break working as a doctor in the NHS, looking after those who are vulnerable.

But of course it's not just those working in hospitals who work on Christmas Day, the list is endless, with so many working right across the festive season to ensure that services continue day and night – carers visiting the elderly and vulnerable in our communities, highways teams, ambulance staff and paramedics, firefighters and police officers, to name but a few. And then there is the army of hardworking public-sector staff, working behind the scenes, to keep everything running smoothly.

Collectively they ensure that our communities are safe and functioning over the festive period, so this Christmas, please spare a thought for all those working tirelessly on our behalf, often in challenging circumstances, yet remaining committed to delivering services compassionately and professionally, despite knowing their loved ones are waiting at home to enjoy Christmas with them after a lengthy shift.

I would therefore like to pay special tribute to all our dedicated and hardworking workforce here in Suffolk, thank you for all you do at Christmas, and all year round.

Sir John Margetson born October 9 1927, died on 17 October 2020

We were saddened to hear of the death of Sir John Margetson after his long struggle with illness. We offer our thoughts and condolence's to his wife Miranda and his two children Andrew and Clare.

As a young Soldier and subsequently as a distinguished Diplomat, Sir John served his country for 40 years in many of the turbulent parts of the world ranging from Palestine, at the end of the British Mandate, through to Saigon at the height of the Vietnam War. He served as the British Ambassador in Hanoi and then as Ambassador to the Netherlands in The Hague. Sir John settled briefly in Easton (The Agents House) before moving to Letheringham in 1980 (The Old Rectory). He was for many years an active member of Letheringham PCC and our Synod representative. As an accomplished musician many will fondly remember Sir John as our organist for over twenty years. As a former St John's College, Cambridge choral scholar, we are not altogether sure what he made of the often off-key notes sung in St Mary's... he never did say, however, it was a great relief to him when the old harmonium was replaced by the electric organ – "so much easier on the legs!"

Whilst we all knew that Sir John was an accomplished musician, and diplomat, we knew very little of his life in both the F&CO and MI6 (SIS),

He was awarded a number of honours in recognition of his service to the Country: appointed CMG in 1979, KCMG in 1986, and from 1992 to 2002 served as Gentleman Usher of the Blue Rod. A more detailed obituary can be found at

PETER HOLDEN TAYLOR (1926–2020)

Peter Taylor spent his early years in Bredfield before winning a scholarship to study at Leiston High School. During the Second World War his school was evacuated to Sudbury and during the week Peter stayed in lodgings whilst at Leiston and Sudbury.

After leaving school Peter returned to Bredfield to work on the family farm with his father.

When Peter settled down with his wife Vera they lived in Dallinghoo at East View whilst later moving to Home Farm and then Merton Farm. Whilst living at Dallinghoo Peter and Vera had three children, Grahame, Alison and Jane. Sadly Alison died in infancy.

After taking over the running of the farm Peter gradually increased the size of the holding and adopted new techniques to increase productivity. During the 1980's one of the his special projects was the extension and total refurbishment of Dallinghoo Jubilee Hall which Peter and Douglas Holland undertook. Peter had always been instrumental in building a new village hall in Bredfield.

When he retired from farming Peter devoted much time to woodturning and following a suggestion by Vera he set out to raise funds for St. Elizbeth's Hospice in Ipswich. Over the next 30 years he turned thousands of items which he sold at woodturning shows and craft fairs eventually raising #100000 for St Elizabeth's Hospice. At other times the proceeds from his woodturning stall went to the East Anglian Children's Hospice, Dallinghoo Church or various other Suffolk churches which he supported. In recognition of his charitable work Peter was awarded the British Empire Medal.

Peter liked making wooden items for local churches including the altar for the chapel at St. Elizabeth's Hospice and the font covers for Dallinghoo, Hoo and Brundish churches.

Peter had an enquiring mind and made many innovations to his woodturning lathe and equipment which were featured in craft magazines such as the Woodturner. He was active in woodturning circles and widely known and respected for is work by national and international craftsmen. Peter served on the committee of the Suffolk Mid-Coastal Woodturners for over 25 years ad was asked to become the clubs first president—a position which he held for the rest of his life.

Peter sadly passed away at Grove Court Care Home in Woodbridge on 5 October 2020. 14

As some of you will be aware I have with the help of one of my staff done quite a bit of tidying in the churchyard recently. Two of the large heaps of rubbish have now been burned up and other than about half of the rear ditch all the trimming has been completed. If we have a dry spell I may try and run a mower over the peripheral areas to check the growth of the Alexander's weed which given a chance would take over! After leaf fall an independent arboricultural inspection of all the trees will be carried out.
