DR DAN POULTER MP Member of Parliament for Central Suffolk and North Ipswich

As I sit to write this month's article, I am hopeful that very soon indeed, we will all soon be enjoying a greater semblance of normality with the current COVID restrictions being lifted as we head into summer.

I know for many of us there was great disappointment that the restrictions weren't all lifted on 21<sup>st</sup> June, but in the circumstances, retaining some of the restrictions for just a little longer seemed to be the only sensible thing to do. In my opinion, it was better to put the brake on slightly now – as the Prime Minister has stated, the next steps out of the road map are irreversible. A small delay until 19<sup>th</sup> July just allows us a little more breathing space to make sure that as many people as possible will have received their vaccinations.

People who are not vaccinated or who have only received one dose are remain particularly vulnerable, so at the moment, it is a race between the vaccine and this highly transmissible form of the virus. Vaccinations are the only way out of this pandemic. Our vaccination effort here in Suffolk remains outstanding, with the county consistently being rated top for its role in vaccinating Suffolk residents. The majority of people here are very happy and proud to receive their vaccine and it is especially encouraging to see our younger cohorts coming forward so enthusiastically to receive their vaccination, especially now that the successful programme has opened to all those over the age of eighteen. Like many of us, they recognise that being vaccinated is the way forward from the restrictions that have hampered us for so long.

For some, there is still a little hesitancy around receiving the vaccine but - if people are not vaccinated, a reservoir of Covid may remain in the wider population and this potentially increases the chances of the virus mutating. The evidence tells us that it is only by having both doses of the vaccine that we have the highest level of protection against becoming seriously will from COVID. Although some may feel that they are protected after just one vaccination, the levels of protection after one jab are around 33%, so it really is imperative to have that second job for maximum protection. Getting vaccinated is everybody's business and responsibility and I would therefore urge everyone to get vaccinated as soon as is practicably possible. We all have a responsibility to protect our friends, family and neighbours who may be more vulnerable than we are.

As we move ahead from 19<sup>th</sup> July, I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible as we start to emerge from the pandemic and look forward to enjoying summer events such as garden fetes and village shows.

#### **CHARSFIELD C OF E PRIMARY SCHOOL**

At Charsfield C of E Primary school we have had a jam packed term! Here are just a few of the things we have been able to do this term.

In PSHE KS2 pupils have been learning about money: how it can be acquired through jobs, benefits and gifts; how it can be spent using cash, debit cards and credit cards and very importantly, how to save it; in the bank or at home. To help them get to grips with the value of money they were set a group challenge of holding an event to raise funds for a charity. They had to divide themselves into teams to handle different aspects of the challenge;

- Marketing team; in charge of promoting the event, posters and advertise ments
- Creative team; to design craft items to sell
- Sales team; to decide on how to sell items and promotions to run on the dav
- Management team; to oversee organisation, problem solving and run the votes.

Finance team; to cost the resources and ingredients, organise funding (petition Mrs Reeve, Head of School, for the funds) and cash up at the end.

They were able to have an after school sale outside (fortunately the weather stayed dry) of all the goodies we had baked and made to raise money. We are delighted to report that the pupils managed to raise a very impressive £50.61 (after costs and float were deducted) for the Rainforest Trust.

In June the pupils made around 30 cards for gentleman residents at Handford House Nursing Home who would otherwise not have received anything on Father's Day. They have been building links with the nursing home over the last year and the children get a lot of satisfaction out of being able to give a little back to the community and enjoy the correspondences they have with the residents.

Our Year 5 and 6 pupils have all taken part in Bikeability, where they learn how to ride a bike safely on the road. Our two instructors, who spent a total of four days with us, were very impressed with the high standards of cycling and behaviour of our pupils. Our Year 6 pupils proved themselves to be incredibly competent so they were able to cycle a slightly more challenging route! We were delighted that everyone passed Level 2 and earned a certificate, booklet and badge in our Celebration Assembly. Well done!

We were thrilled to be able to hold our annual Sports Day this year and, even more importantly, invite our parents to watch the races in the afternoon. In the morning the children were in their bubble groups and took part in activities with their House Team. In the afternoon, parents were able to come and watch the children take part in relay races in their bubble groups. It was a really successful day, where every child was made to feel valued and encouraged by their team mates. The weather was kind to us with a mixture of sunny, fine, dry weather and we were incredibly lucky to finish just before an enormous downpour!

We are looking forward to the last few days of term, where our KS2 pupils will be performing Treasure Island to small audiences and KS1 pupils will be visiting Norwich Castle and seeing Dippy the Dinosaur on their first school trip this year! #### **CYRIL JAMES KINDRED**

Cyril James Kindred was born on November 26th 1930 the youngest child of Alfred and Florence Kindred: He was one of nine surviving children having 4 brothers and 4 sisters. Sadly, my grandparents also had twins who were stillborn.

Cyril grew up in Hacheston and went to school there before moving on to Wickham Market senior school, leaving at the age of 14.

He started work for A.J.Hall & Sons, the local grocery shop, and would be seen delivering groceries on a trade bike. When he was old enough he passed his driving test and Halls bought a mobile shop which Cyril would drive around the local villages Marlesford, Hacheston, Parham, Pettistree, Loudham, Blaxhall, Tunstall, Easton and Charsfield.

In 1971 The Hall family sold the business to The Co-op and Cyril continued to work for them, originally as a grocery driver but when this service stopped he transferred to the Dairy department and continued to deliver Gold, Silver, Red, Blue, and Green tops to the people of Wickham Market.

Many a time Cyril would go beyond the call of duty and do things for his customers, who amounted to over 500 at the time.

He would do shopping, collect prescriptions and other odd jobs for his loyal customers: I've known him to light fires, get the coal in,hang out washing and load washing machines - nothing was ever too much trouble for him to help people out. He continued to work as a milkman until he retired in 1995.

After delivering the milk Cyril would go home, have something to eat and drink, then head off to Shrubbery Farm and help the Kitson family out in the afternoons during the Harvest and Autumn busy period.

Well I say he retired he didn't because the Kitson family then had chickens on the farm and he became a delivery driver for them delivering eggs all over Suffolk, all this time as a delivery driver he would seldom be seen without his collar and tie on.

After the egg deliver business finished Cyril then went on to become the caretaker at the village hall which he did up until failing eyesight, Macular Degeneration, was diagnosed and then Cyril finally retired.

Cyril did National service in the RAF and we remember him telling us that when he was flying with a pilot the pilot said he was going to loop the loop again. Cyril was not impressed. Des O Connor was also serving in the RAF at this time.

Cyril kept a good garden and I remember as a young child always wanting to go out with him and help or hinder in my own way.

We planted Potatoes, Onion sets and Bean seed together at the time as I was too young to handle the smaller seeds. I remember someone saying to him once "Cyril you don't seem to have any flowers in your garden" to which he replied, "The only flowers that I'm interested in growing are the ones I can eat - Cauliflowers". During this time of part time work he also served the village as a Parish Councillor, was on the village hall committee, a Deacon here at the Chapel and also the local co-ordinator of the Poppy Appeal and collector for the Red Cross.

Cyril and Ruth met probably at school but started courting in the early 1950's. They were married Charsfield Chapel on March 12th 1955 - 66 years ago.

Philip arrived in September 1958 and Neville in July 1961.

Philip and Cilla were married in June 1990.

Cyril and Ruth were absolutely delighted when James joined the family in July 1993 and Naomi in July 1996, Hollie and Coran have became part of the family in 2019.

Cyril was always a family man who loved having the family around him when he was able to go out on trips with them - we all have fond memories of trips out with him.

Neville and I have fond memories of our family holidays when we were young We always went to a caravan site in Pakefield near Lowestoft and much fun was had at that time.

On a Thursday night we would go to Nicholas Everitt park in Oulton Broad to watch the power boat racing, funny thing was Cyril was never very fond of water, except for a wash or shower.

Cyril had an operation for cancer in Norwich hospital in 2000 but he bounced back.

In 2018 he fell and broke his thigh and another stay in hospital but still he came back from this.

He bought himself a rollator and would be seen walking around Chapel Lane and the minor roads in the village. Everybody would always stop and speak to him he was a very well-liked and respected man.

Cyril passed peacefully away in Hospital at 5am on June 25<sup>th</sup>; the time he would normally leave the Woodbridge depot to deliver the milk in Wickham Market.

Finally there is a comical Benny Hill song about Ernie fastest milkman in the West, a lyric from which says "They wont forget Ernie"

Charsfield and Wickham Market won't forget Cyril.
