Whereas now there is little or no work available and people either drive out of the villages for work or work from home alone, in each case they are not out and about in the villages. Likewise most of the shops and small businesses are gone, so we are forced to go further to shop or find entertainment.

Although that type of community is relegated to history, many of the villages have community WhatsApp groups or something similar, which enable people to stay in touch quickly and easily. This has been invaluable to enable people to help each other out during the pandemic. This proves to me there is still the need for old fashioned community spirit, and that people do still want to feel part of their community, and to help those in need.

Now that the pandemic seems to be coming more under control, there is a need for the community to get together face to face, rather than digitally, if people feel safe to do so. Village and church events are starting up again, please give them your support. I know most will still look out of the villages for entertainment but your community and church needs your support, at least some of the time.

EARL SOHAM - A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY

I am often asked questions on village history and have come to realise that there are many people new to the village who are curious as to what went on in the past, both ancient and more recent. I suspect that there are very few residents who know that the Parish Council is, in fact, Lord of the Manor of Earl Soham, I was Parish Clerk for about thirty years and was privileged to be present when the Lordship was generously given to the village by the executors of Dr. Harold Paul Lehmann of Wickham Market, to celebrate H.M. The Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977. The papers were signed over to the Parish Council on 4th June 1979. The Parish paid the legal costs involved and all relative paperwork is now held at Suffolk Records Office, The Hold, Ipswich.

Most of the following information is taken from the Sale Particulars of C. M. Stanford & Son and Strutt & Parker, when the Beaumont Collection of Lord-ship's of the Manors was dispersed.

THE MANOR OF EARL SOHAM

"A Manor was held here in Saxon times by Anand, a freeman by commendation under the Abbot of St. Edmunds. It consisted of 4 Carucates of land, 15 villeins, 8 bordars, 2 serfs, 2 ploughteams in demesne and 6 belonging to the men. Also wood sufficient to support 100 hogs, 12 acres of meadow, 2 rouncies, 4 beasts, 30 hogs, 42 sheep and 60 goats valued at £10. At the time of the Survey this manor was held in demesne by Earl Alan . The bordars were increased to 21 and the serfs reduced to 1, the ploughteams belonging to the men had come down to 5 while the value had been gradually increased to £16, and then to £18.13.4. It was a league long and half a league broad and paid in a gelt 8 1/2d." (Copinger Vol. IV p. 251)

In 1140 the Lordship was vested in Herbert de Montcheney, who sold it to Hugh Bigot, Earl of Norfolk: he became Steward of the King's Household, and supported the cause of Stephen, so on Stephen's succession, he was rewarded with the Earldom of the East Angles. Later, however, he became a follower of the Empress Maud and at the Battle of Lincoln took Stephen prisoner. But when Stephen resumed the throne Bigot had "to compound with a large sum and give hostages". Later still he went to the Holy Land and made war with the infidels. He died in 1176. Roger Bigot his son inherited. He was one of the four Knights who carried the Canopy of State at the King's second coronation in 1194. Then the Lordship passed through the son to grandson Roger who was present at the signing of Magna Carta. The Manor remained in the Bigot family until 1309 when it passed to King Edward II. He granted it in 1312 to Thomas Plantagenet, Plantagenet, surnamed de Brollerton. From him it passed by marriage to the de Montacutes who held it until 1380, when Margaret, Countess of Norfolk , became Lady. She died in 1400 and the Manor then passed to Elizabeth, Duchess of Norfolk, and in 1410 to the Crown.

In 1423 John Mowbray, Duke of Norfolk, held the Manor and it remained with the de Mowbravs until the time of Thomas Howard, 3rd Duke of Norfolk. It is uncertain who was the next Lord, but John Cornwallis held it at the time of King James I; he died in 1615 and was succeeded by his son. The Manor was sold to John Cotton (1625); he died in 1655 badly in debt having supported the Royal Cause, so his son had to sell to Leicester Devereux, 6th Viscount Hereford, and it remained in that family until 8th August, 1748, when it is recorded the First Court Baron of Thomas Huiston Esq and Robert Moxon. Elizabeth Boyfield was Lady in 1787 but, on 27th June 1788 John Ayton held his first Court. On 18th March 1836, Sir John Patteson Knt., and The Rev. Thomas Wright Whitaker, Clerk are recorded as being joint Lords. On 13th May 1840, Robert Crabtree held his first Court and on October 13th, 1876, Charles Henry Capen, from whom it passed to George Frederick Beaumont. In 1954 the Lordship passed to Dr. Harold Paul Lehmann, medical practitioner in Wickham Market. On 4th June, 1979 ownership passed to the Parish Council of Earl Soham, a Jubilee gift by the Executors of Dr. Lehmann. Most of the Manorial Records are held at the Suffolk Records Office, The Hold, Ipswich. A few extracts following show, how what was originally only a custom became in effect a Law, which had to be obeyed by both Lord and Tenant.

"If cattle stray into the Lordshipp and remain there for a year or more then they belong to the Lord by the name of an Estraye."

"If any goods are left in the Lordshipp that are stolen by one that flee then the same doe belong to the Lord by the name of a waive or of goods waived."

"If anye skareth Deere I the Lords Parke orkill them or do hunt or kill anye hares there or do anye trespass" they were liable to a fine.

"Also that there were Bondmen of blood by ancient custome within the said Manor." These "do

give to the Lord IIIId and a peece for lycence to dwell out of the Lordship by the name of Chevage."

"Also that if anyone doth resort suspiciously to another man's wife carnally to know her or any man servant to the maidservant of another man, carnally to know her this frequently the wife or servant to know her this frequently the wife or servant they are to be in mid 6d."

Youngest Son as heir- Borough English. (Also see an Article by the Late Mr. G. F. Beaumont in East Anglian Notes and Queries, N.S. Vol II, p. 215). In the Court of 18th August, 1756 there is an entry concerning the Ancient Evidence of Rolls as to the custom of the Lord granting licences before any tenant can "cut down any timber or other trees growing upon the waste or copyhold lands of this Manor" even though it was "for the necessary repairing of the buildings standing on the copyhold land of the said Manor".

DR DAN POULTER MP Member of Parliament for Central Suffolk and North Ipswich

31 August 2021

Summer is my favourite season because it means that I can spend more time at home in Suffolk. But this year, my summer was interrupted by the sudden recall of Parliament caused by the Taliban regaining control of Afghanistan.

Many of us will remember where we were on September 11th, 2001 when the twin towers in New York were destroyed by Al-Quaeda terrorists. I also recall the day in 2005 when London was bombed by members of the same Islamic terrorist group.

At that time, Afghanistan was used by Al-Qaeda as a base from which to conduct world terror against western nations, such as the USA and the United Kingdom. Whatever history's verdict may be on the wisdom, conduct or shambolic conclusion of the 20-year war on Afghanistan, I remain in no doubt that it was right for Britain to intervene in the fight against Al-Qaeda and global terrorism. We were right to put British boots on the ground in Afghanistan and play our part in defeating the threat of Islamic terrorism.

The lightning speed of the Taliban advance probably had two causes. The first is the failure of the west to win the hearts and minds of the rural communities of Afghanistan. The second is that once former President Trump had done his deal with the Taliban to withdraw US troops, the Taliban used the next 17 months for secret negotiations with many provinces to surrender without contest.

We should also reflect that even though the Taliban has reclaimed control over Afghanistan (for the time being at least), this doesn't mean that the safety of the world is under the same threat of terrorism now as we were some 20 or so years ago because thanks to the efforts of British armed forces, Al-Qaeda is no longer the threat it once was to the safety of innocent civilians in the United Kingdom.

Our priority now must be to recognise our moral duty to protect and offer refuge to Afghan citizens who may now be at risk, particularly those who have supported our soldiers in the fight against Al-Qaeda. The Government has rightly announced a new resettlement scheme for Afghan refugees. As part of this scheme, it will rightly be asking our councils in Suffolk to do their part, and already, a small number of Afghan interpreters and their families have been helped to resettle in Suffolk.

As we close this chapter in the history of Afghanistan, I am mindful that a number of Suffolk families have lost the lives of loved ones who served on the frontline of the conflict. We all owe those who sacrificed their lives a debt of gratitude for what they have done to make our country a safer place, and in protecting us against the threat of Islamic terrorism. Hopefully, members of the community who use the ground regularly and have a vested interest in its longevity.



SHCT CYCLE RIDE.

Ashfield Church welcomed four cyclists this year which although much down on last year is about average. Unfortunately our position, approached either by a very long climb from the north or the busy A1120 to the south, doesn't exactly encourage cyclists. Nevertheless we were as always open supporting this now national event. Between welcoming riders and holding some meetings whilst manning the church I spent some time tidying up in the churchyard ready for the winter.

PARISH COUNCIL.

At the September meeting we were delighted to be able to co-opt Chris Sharpe onto the Council to fill one of the vacancies. The main topic of discussion during the evening was that of 'antisocial behavior' [ASB] within the village something that has been ongoing for somewhile now and has increased significantly recently. We are working with Mid Suffolk District Council and other agencies in an attempt to bring things back under control. All residents on the parish email will have received an online form on which to record instances, we strongly urge people to do this as this sort of thing will provide vital evidence for the authorities to take action. Alternatively information can be sent directly to the Parish Clerk [contact details at back of mag] all such information will be treated as confidential unless the person submitting it lets us know they are happy to be contacted.

A resident brought up the subject of 'speeding' in the village. The PC will look at this again once the results of the recent traffic survey are known.

The next meeting is scheduled for 8th December.

ROADSIDE HEDGES.

A reminder to all residents with roadside hedges that these should be maintained, cut back to be no closer than 50cm, preferably 1m if possible to the edge of the road so as to provide pedestrian refuge. Where this cannot be achieved and visibility for access/egress is impaired hedges should be kept no higher than 1050mm [42"]. Anyone with queries in this regard is asked to contact Cllr Robert Grimsey and help/guidance will be provided. Where exceptionally a hedge is overgrown Suffolk County Council does have powers to get the hedge cut/removed or do the work and recover the cost from the landowner! Your cooperation on this important road safety matter will be appreciated.


