PARISH COUNCIL VACANCIES.

At the present time Ashfield-cum-Thorpe Parish Council has two vacancies. We are entitled to have a full complement of seven Councillors, we currently have five. Typically your involvement would entail attending four or five meetings per year and assisting where appropriate with specific tasks/projects around the parish. Thank you.

FLYTIPPING, TAKING RUBBISH TO THE DUMP.

Sadly as you may have read in the local press there has been a significant increase in the instances of fly tipping across Suffolk and other parts of the country recently. Not only is this very unsightly it is often dangerous to animals and humans not to mention expensive to clear up whether that be by the local council or the landowner. Should you witness an act of fly tipping taking place please try and get a description/registration number of any vehicle/s and forward this information to the police.

Whilst I am quite sure the good citizens of the Mid Loes Benefice that this magazine covers would never fly tip it is worth noting that it is now necessary to pre-book to take household rubbish to any of the Household Waste Recycling Centres run by Suffolk County Council. Booking has to be done online at <u>www.suffolkrecycling.org.uk</u> and can be made upto seven days in advance. The website tells you how to go about booking and what you can/cannot do when at the HWRC.

ROADSIDE DITCHES.

Whilst there is no doubt that the winter that is now behind us was quite a wet one I do not believe that any records were broken with regards to the amount of rainfall. Driving around Suffolk it would be very easy to blame Suffolk County Council for not looking after the highway's drainage and indeed I am sure that there are situations where that is the case! However the focus of this article is to point out to all landowners that we have a responsibility to clean out/maintain ditches and drains within our curtilage many of which form part of the extensive drainage network that carries surface water into the river system and ultimately out to sea. If you have experienced standing water or flooding on the road outside your premises is it because a ditch or drain you are responsible for is blocked/obstructed preventing the water from getting away? All ditches require a certain amount of upkeep, sometimes this may just be an annual clearance of vegetation, whilst in others the removal of silt deposits from the bottom of the ditch will be required periodically, remembering that the bottom of the ditch should always be below the level of any pipes discharging water into it otherwise the pipes end up getting blocked with the potential of causing major problems further afield! So the next time there is standing surface on the road water outside your property take a look, see where it should be draining away to, if that entails running through a ditch/ drain in your ownership then action on your part is required. SCC do have the powers to get landowners to maintain their ditches and exceptionally may undertake the work themselves and charge the responsible party, an expense best avoided! RG.

DR DAN POULTER MP Member of Parliament for Central Suffolk and North Ipswich

As we look ahead to Easter and to the longer days and warmer weather, I'd like to start by paying credit to our health leaders and all those involved in the rollout of the vaccination programme here in Suffolk, including the fantastic army of volunteers giving up their time to help with the effort. It's thanks to their combined efforts that Suffolk is at the top of the league tables nationally for people receiving their first Covid vaccination.

We have come such a long way in the fight against coronavirus and there is very definitely light at the end of the tunnel, but for now we must continue to follow the rules as we tentatively start to emerge from lockdown. We are all keen to get back to some semblance of normality – to visit our families and our friends, but if we relax the restrictions too soon, we could very quickly find ourselves back at square one with infection rates rising again, alongside increased hospital admissions and deaths. It only takes three or four weeks, particularly with some of the more virulent strains that have emerged, for things to get out of hand.

Understandably there are concerns about the spread of the new variants, but current evidence seems to suggest that both the Pfizer and Oxford Astra Zeneca vaccines remain effective. The best way for all of us out of this pandemic is through vaccination and I would urge everyone to get vaccinated as soon as is practicably possible.

The first steps out of lockdown saw our children and young people returning to their schools and education settings. Whilst our hardworking teachers and teaching assistants have really stepped up to the challenges of remote learning, nothing can match the importance of face to face learning in the classroom.

Assuming infection rates and hospital admissions continue to fall, and the vaccination programme continues at pace, non-essential retail and hospitality venues can also soon begin to reopen and whilst I know the delay is frustrating, it doesn't benefit businesses to open for two or three weeks and then have to close again as restrictions were lifted too early.

As the weather continues to improve, we know that transmission outdoors is reduced, and I know that we are all looking forward to being able to gradually mix outdoors as a first step in getting back to some sort of normality. I am hopeful that if we continue to stick with it and follow the guidance, we can all look forward to much happier times ahead.

DALLINGHOO NOTES

St Mary's Dallinghoo Repairs Further Update

The repair work to our upper masonry is now completed, and the scaffolding is about to come down. Huge thanks to all the people who have contributed to our fund raising so far. We are getting closer but are still short of our overall target and we would be thrilled if you went to our JustGiving site and searched on Dallinghoo to make a donation. Every little helps...

The repairs to date have now made the building mostly watertight and so the drying out has started! The builders are next focusing on the lower edges of the walls and the porch roof. Many of you will know that St Mary's is very unusual as the tower is at the east end! This is because the chancel was inadvertently demolished when the tower, overloaded with bells, collapsed onto it in the 1700's.

Some of the new stone blocks are huge!

We have had to replace a number of the larger blocks of stone that were crumbling away. To match the originals the new stones have come from quarries in Rutland, Somerset and even from Caen in north western France which was a favourite of the Normans. The buttress weathering stone in the picture is made from stoke ground Bath stone which has a distinctive buff colour that mellows to a honey colour over time. It weighs 50kg and so it was quite a challenge to get it up to the buttress where it is now safely installed. This new stone will now be in place for hundreds of years to come.



Our stone masons are artists

To repair a section of the buttress our lead stone mason, Terry, hand cut new flints to match the original pattern and then set them into the wall. They look fantastic and can now be seen high up on the face of the south east buttress.

Our architect has been excellent

The repair programme has been developed and is being overseen by our architect Nick Jacob. He has been central to all our decisions about what to repair and how to do it. He has an encyclopaedic knowledge of church construction and has had to develop several innovative solutions to the problems that we have faced. In the picture he is next to our new tabling stones high on the west parapet.

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We have been awarded several grants, but we are still short of funds

We have been very enthusiastic with our local fund raising over the last few years and have raised a substantial contribution toward the repairs. In addition, we have been applying to a number of grant-giving foundations that also want to help preserve our church. Without their substantial help it is unlikely we would ever have been able to undertake the repairs. Our major grant-givers so far have been the ChurchCare /

Wolfson Foundation, the Garfield Weston Foundation and the Allchurches Trust and we owe huge thanks to all of them.

CHARSFIELD PRIMARY SCHOOL

This term at Charsfield has been different to what we initially expected; staff had been busy preparing for a full return to school in January, but we then found ourselves faced with several weeks of home learning for a number of our pupils. We were delighted to be able to welcome back all of our pupils to school on Monday 8th March. Despite the challenges that we have faced, our pupils have all had daily online live lessons with their teachers, exciting and interesting lessons to engage with, and have been able to move forward and progress with their learning in all areas of the curriculum.

Now that we are all back at school pupils have settled back into the daily routine of school life, and the first exciting event we celebrated was World Book Day. On Wednesday 10th March pupils and staff dressed up as book characters; ranging from Puss in Boots to Harry Potter; and took part in different book related activities in their bubble groups. The day was rounded off with our weekly session of Share a Biscuit, Share a Story where the children find a comfy place to sit, and enjoy a biscuit whilst listening to a story.



As part of our commitment to our pupils' mental health and wellbeing, we hold weekly

forest school lessons for all of our pupils. Forest schools takes place in our wonderful school grounds and gives pupils the opportunity to learn about different aspects of nature and to take risks in a safe environment. The school is also taking part in the Suffolk Libraries Scarecrow Trail and we have chosen to use our love of Julia Donaldson books and the morals that these books teach us.

We continue to link with the Activities Leader at Handford House, a nursing home in Ipswich that has 54 residents with both dementia and physical disabilities. This is used as part the focus for the pupils PSHE and mental health and wellbeing, they understand the type of difficulties that the residents struggle with and have kept in touch with them since the summer last year. This term, the pupils been looking at how making mistakes isn't something to worry about and how we can learn that if something goes wrong, you can make it into something new or have another go. The pupils have created a "Beautiful ops" handmade folder, making lovely pictures from mistakes such as coffee cup rings, ink spills and a bit of torn paper. The "Beautiful Oops" folder will go to the home for residents to thumb through or use as a source of an activity. The pupils were also very aware that some of the female residents, might not receive a Mother's day card this week and have made some extra beautiful flowery cards to be given out even to those who perhaps aren't Mums or who might have lost a child.

As this term moves towards the Easter holiday, we all keep our fingers crossed that the national situation moves on and we can resume normal school life.
