Cretingham, Monewden and Hoo Parish Council

At our March meeting we discussed the installation of the Speed Indicator Device (SID) in Cretingham. This is due for delivery in late April and should be operational by the time you read this article. Quotes are being requested from SCC Highways for replacement finger posts where the existing ones are damaged, illegible or rusted beyond repair. Once we have this data we will consider how many of the 17 fingerposts around our three villages we can afford to replace. The money to pay for this work will come from the Community Infrastructure Levy budget we have been allocated as a result of new house-building in Cretingham - this is also funding the SID.

Your Councillors also agreed to work with our colleagues in Brandeston, Kettleburgh and Easton councils to extend the number of "Floral Highways" in the area. In order to preserve the wildflowers on road verges we have asked that the road-verges from Monewden to Brandeston (Friday Street) and from Cretingham to Brandeston (Brandeston Road) be left uncut until the flowers have set their seeds. Where a visibility or other road safety issue requires cutting this will, however, be carried out as usual. We will review this decision in a year's time.

We received verbal reports from our County Councillor, Cllr Gowrley, and our District Councillor, Cllr Cook, who both spoke of the support that their Councils have passported from central government to local businesses during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Our next meeting is to be held by Zoom on Tuesday 11th May. Login details will be published on our website seven days prior to the meeting along with an agenda. <u>http://</u> <u>cretinghammonewdenhoo.onesuffolk.net</u>

DR DAN POULTER MP Member of Parliament for Central Suffolk and North Ipswich

I'm sure many of us have very much enjoyed being able to see family, friends and loved ones over the Easter weekend – in some cases, for the first time in many months, as some of the restrictions began to lift on 29^{th} March. From 12^{th} April non-essential retail can open, pubs and hospitality venues can serve food and drink outdoors, outdoor attractions will be open to visitors and overnight stays at self-catering accommodation can also resume.

We have come such a long way in the fight against coronavirus and there is now most definitely light at the end of the tunnel, but for now we must continue to follow the rules as we tentatively start to emerge from lockdown. It only takes three or four weeks, particularly with some of the more virulent strains that have emerged, for things to get out of hand.

Vaccinations are the only way out of this pandemic. Our vaccination effort here in Suffolk is outstanding, with the county consistently being rated top for its role in vaccinating Suffolk residents. However, some people remain hesitant to have their vaccine - if people are not vaccinated, a reservoir of Covid may remain in the wider population and this potentially increases the chances of the virus mutating. In this case, if the virus mutates, there is a chance that vaccines will become less effective. Getting vaccinated is everybody's business and responsibility and I would therefore urge everyone to get vaccinated as soon as is practicably possible.

At this stage, we don't yet know if people will require a booster vaccination every year, a little like the annual 'flu jab, but we do know that the very elderly and those with suppressed immune systems may need boosters in any case as the vaccines may be slightly less effective in this group. For anyone considering potentially not having the vaccine, please remember that we all have a responsibility to protect our friends, family and neighbours who may be more vulnerable than we are.

In encouraging people to have their vaccination, it is vitally Important to dispel some of the dangerous myths and falsehoods which are currently circulating around vaccine safety. All of the current evidence suggests that the Covid vaccines are safe. I understand that some of the information which is currently found on social media can be worrying, but I would advise everyone to check on the NHS website for the real facts, before perhaps inadvertently passing on or relying on information that might not be true. Vaccines are the best way to protect yourself and those around you from COVID-19. The vaccine can save lives.

With warmer weather ahead we know that transmission outdoors is reduced, and I remain cautiously optimistic that if we continue to stick with it and follow the guidance, we can all look forward to much happier times ahead.

St Mary's Dallinghoo Phase II Repairs Completion

Phase II of our repair programme is now almost complete and so our challenge is to raise enough grants and donations to complete the internal repairs in phase III!

We have a new porch roof, but what do the bees think about it?

The old porch roof had undergone multiple repairs over the years ending up with many of the tiles being held in place by just a blob of mortar - so when one got dislodged a whole cluster fell down. It turned out that the wooden batons were all rotten and needed replacing. Part of the challenge was that the porch roof is also the home of a rather active hive of bees. Luckily our local bee expert was on hand to help make sure that the bees also like their newly refurbished home.



The vestry is split in half

It seemed rather alarming to the layman that the end wall of the vestry had a split running the whole way up it. Was it about to split into two halves? The architect was far less concerned and under his direction the two halves have now been 'stitched' back together.

The spiral staircase up our tower was treacherous

Our turret stairs are a very tight and narrow spiral with very little natural light and over many years the treads had worn or collapsed making the ascent and descent a job for a qualified rock climber or mountain goat. Some treads were still made of stone, some repaired with brick and others with wood which had now also worn away. So, our builders have been repairing them properly step by step and, although still narrow and steep, they will soon be all regular and easier to climb.

Our pew platform was a trampoline

One of the consequences of the damp in the walls is that in one corner of the nave the joists under the floor had rotted away. This meant that the wooden pew platform above was only fully supported on two sides and so, if you were sitting in that area, the gentle swaying could make you feel sea-sick! Thankfully, we are now renewing the joists, and all will soon be stable and sober once more.



We have been awarded several grants, but we are still short of funds Our local fund raising over the last few years has raised a substantial contribution toward the repairs. In addition, we have been applying to a number of grant-giving foundations who also want to help preserve our church.

Without their substantial help it is unlikely we would ever have been able to undertake the repairs. Our final major grant-givers for this phase are the Suffolk Historic Churches Trust and the National Churches Trust and we owe huge thanks to all of them.
