As I continue to settle into my new life here in Suffolk, I have spent a few days reflecting on my first two months, reflecting on the churches that I have the privilege of serving, reflecting on the people I have met across the benefice and reflecting on the ministry that is undertaken across the eight parishes.

One area of ministry, both here in the benefice and within the wider diocese that I have been learning about, is the role of the Elder, a role that is new to me and a role that I now know to be unique to Suffolk.

Within the Benefice of Mid-Loes, we have three Elders, people who have been commissioned to enable them to undertake various tasks within the church, as well as providing much needed pastoral support to the congregations and communities, something that I know has been so important during the past two years. But, this support continues and I am delighted to also now be undertaking home visiting and administering Home Communion to those that request it.

The role of the Elder is to help with leading worship, providing pastoral care in their local congregation and community. An Elder might visit people at home or in hospital, would be able to lead Morning and Evening Prayer, read the Bible in worship, distribute bread or wine at Communion, a varied role, but an important one within the Ministry Team here within the Benefice of Mid-Loes. One very exciting conversation that has recently taken place is that someone has expressed an interest in the role and the training required in becoming an Elder, so I thought I would take this opportunity to not only highlight the role of the Elder, but to also open up a discussion about 'calling', that moment when you realise that God is encouraging you to consider a different direction in your life, or perhaps just encouraging you to offer your gifts and talents to the church in a way you might not have considered before.

My own personal 'calling' from God to change the direction of my life didn't happen until I was 47 years old and was a unique experience to me and one that I look forward to sharing with you at some point. I won't deny that it took a little time to recognise that this is how God operates, he recognises people from all walks of life, people with different gifts and talents, but most of all people with a faith, a faith that he asks to be shared with others through various roles, in my case it was to become a Priest, for others it might be to become a Reader or a Lay Minister, a Churchwarden, or for some... an Elder.

If you feel 'called' by God to a role within the church, perhaps you might have been resisting the 'calling', or if you would like to explore the role of an Elder in more detail, I would love to hear your story and to discuss further.

'The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ'. (Ephesians 4:11-12) Love and Blessings, Revd Gary

They will provide a living memory of the Queen's incredible 70 years reign and give much pleasure to everyone in the years to come. Thank you Robert for not only so generously making this happen but for everything you do all the year around for the betterment of Ashfield for us residents!'

PLATINUM JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS.

On Saturday 4th June a good number of Ashfield folk of all ages gathered in the grounds of the Village Hall for a BBQ hosted by the Community Council for residents. It was really good to be able to be together without any restrictions following a very difficult two years. The weather was very kind to us as well, enabling people to sit around and catch up with friends and neighbours alike. At 4pm the Chairman of the Parish Council Robert Grimsey called everybody to order for a tree 'planting' ceremony to mark the occasion. In a speech he reflected on aspects of village life over the last 70 years. Did you know that in 1952 there were at least 14 working farms, now there is really only one, the rest being worked from outside of the parish. There were only around 50 dwellings, now there are 87! The night soil man was still visiting, mains sewage didn't arrive until the 1980's. It is interesting to note that there are I believe now only four adults who can claim to be truly 'lifelong' Ashfield residents, in 1952 almost all would have lived here all their lives and many would also have found employment in the village for the most part working on the many farms or domestic service at the bigger houses. We also learned that the 1952 Coronation party was hosted by the Youngman family at Thorpe Hall, a walk across the field for many! The tree which was already in the ground was topped off by a village celebrity, Doreen Baxter the oldest lifelong resident of the parish ably assisted by her niece. Following this everyone was encouraged to stand and we heartily sang the National Anthem. My thanks to the Community Council for all of their efforts in making this truly unique event such a memorable occasion. RG.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS.

At the July meeting as well as the routine business of planning and finance we discussed the failure of SCC Highways to cut the roadside verges again this year. It was agreed that the clerk would pursue this with them because of the safety implications to residents with no pedestrian refuge. Still on the subject of road safety the Council also agreed to press SCC to clear the overgrown visibility splays along the A1120 at its junction with The Street. The Chairman has reported this and a response has come in saying the required work will be done within 20 working days. Since we discussed this we have become aware of a rather serious accident having taken place in this vicinity. Hopefully the planned works will help prevent any such recurrence.

Whilst on the subject of hedges I would like to remind everyone that any roadside hedge should be maintained at least 50cm back from the side of the road. At the present time there are a few rather overgrown hedges in the village. It would be appreciated by all that these be cut back in the near future please. If anyone is concerned by the implications of this please do not hesitate to contact the Chairman Robert Grimsey who can advise on the best course of action. In extreme cases SCC can serve hedge cutting notices requiring work to be undertaken to their specification, hopefully this will not be necessary in Ashfield!

I know that some of you make use of the SCC Highways Reporting Tool to report highways related issues. It would be very helpful to the Parish Council if you could let us have knowledge of the report number you receive as this enables us to monitor the situation and on occasion possibly get the problem resolved more promptly.

The next scheduled meeting is on Monday 12th September in the Village Hall. RG.


